

This period in our financial year is one of those periods where we are busy with the financial management and planning processes of two financial years simultaneously.

We have just before the end of February 2024, successfully passed the 2023/24 financial year Adjustment Budget and in terms of legislation, are we legally compelled to revise and update our Service Delivery and Budget Implementation Plan (SDBIP) and Organisational and Individual Performance Scorecards for the 2023/24 financial year. With 1 April 2024 drawing nearer, we will enter the last (4th) quarter of our 2023/24 financial year, ending 30 June 2024.

Also, we are now in this month of March 2024, most busy in finalizing our draft of our second amendment 2024/25 of our Integrated Development Plan for the 5-year period 2022 to 2027, as well as our draft 3-year aligned MTREF budget. Both the draft IDP and draft Budget for 2024/25 must be passed, in terms of legislation, before the end of March 2024, by our Council. Our Council meeting is scheduled for 27 March 2024.

STREAMLINING TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE AND EVENT APPROVALS IN LANGEBERG MUNICIPALITY

Langeberg Municipality has implemented an efficient approval process for temporary road closures, showcasing a commitment to responsive governance. This streamlined approach ensures transparency, efficiency, and citizen satisfaction. Let's delve into the key steps of this process and explore how it adapts for events requiring road closures.

1. Comprehensive Application Submission

Citizens initiate the process by submitting completed application forms, including necessary documentation for the following road closures: Funerals, Matric Farewells, Cultural Events, Weddings, Birthdays and Family Reunions This step sets the foundation for understanding each request, ensuring subsequent stages focus on efficient processing.

2. Consultation with Ward Councillors

Applications then progress to the respective Ward Councillor for community engagement and comments. This phase establishes a crucial connection between the municipality and the local community.

3. Director's Approval Process

Memorandums and letters, including the application and Councillor's comments, are compiled and submitted to the Director of Engineering Services for final approval. This step emphasizes a thorough review of each application.

4. Keeping Applicant Informed

Upon approval, prompt notifications are sent to applicants, guiding them through the payment process. Transparent communication ensures citizens are well-informed about the progress of their requests, fostering trust in municipal procedures. 5. Coordinated Notifications to Relevant Departments After payment confirmation, necessary approvals are disseminated to key departments, such as local SAPS and traffic departments. This ensures recordkeeping and facilitates the prompt delivery of materials for road closure.

Adaptation for Event Road Closure Applications:

6. Involvement of Manager Local Economic Development

For events requiring road closures, the basic application is submitted. Upon receiving the road closure application, it is forwarded to Manager LED, Mrs. Cook, who requests the event organizer to complete an event application document.

7. Comments and Approval

The completed application is sent to Ms. S Jansen, Chief Clerk: Committees, for comments. If the event is approved, the approval letter specifies that the approval is subject to road closure approval. The process then seamlessly continues from point 2 above.

8. Liquor License Application


If a liquor license is required, the event application process is followed. The approval letter states that the road closure is conditionally approved, subject to the approval of the liquor license The liquor license is provided as part of the application.

This adapted process ensures that events requiring road closures are seamlessly integrated into the established temporary road closure approval framework, further enhancing municipal services and responsiveness. We urge the public to note that all event applications must be submitted at least 60 days prior to the event.

HOW TO APPLY FOR EVENTS

All events in the Langeberg Municipal area has to go through an application and approval process to ensure the event is safe for the public and comply to the municipality's Events By-law. Event applications need to be submitted at least two month before the actual event date. The following steps will guide you through how the process works.



BUSINESSES AND SPAZA SHOPS In the langeberg municipal Area that need a licence

If you are operating any of the following businesses in the Langeberg municipal area, you must be in possession of a Business License, in terms of the Business Act, 1991 (Act 71 of 1991). The following formal and informal business needs to apply:

1. Formal Businesses

- Any business providing meals for on, or off the premises consumption (for example: hot dogs, hamburgers, sandwiches, wraps, breakfast, and sit-down meals).
- Any business trading in perishable foodstuffs (for example: milk, meat, fish, and fish products).
- Any facility providing Turkish baths, saunas, and health baths and any facility providing massages, or infra-red treatment.
- Any business making the provision of escort services of males and/or females available.
- Any business keeping 3, or more mechanical, electronic, or electrical devices for recreation or amusement (for example: slot machines, Pin Ball machines)
- Any business keeping 3, or more snooker or billiard tables.
- Any business operating a night club, or discotheque.
- Any business operating a cinema, or theatre.
- Any business conducting an adult premises in terms of Section 24 of the Films and Publications Act, 1996.

2. Informal Businesses

Any business selling foodstuffs in the form of meals, or perishable foodstuffs which is conveyed from place to place by vehicle, or from a movable structure (for example: a food truck or trailer, a temporary structure at an event, or a market, or from an approved informal trading area).

3. The following businesses are exempt from obtaining a business license:

- Business operated by the state or municipality (e.g.: municipal canteen).
- Business operated by a charitable, religious, educational, or cultural institution, agricultural organization, only if all the profits are solely devoted to the purposes of that organization (e.g., school tuck shop, church bazaar).
- The informal traders selling clothing, flowers, haberdashery, fruit, and vegetables from an approved informal trading area.
- All other formal and informal businesses not mentioned above.

4. Application process: Business Licences

- The application form must be completed, and the applicable levy paid.
- The completed application form and proof of payment must be submitted to the Municipality.
- The application form will be circulated for comments and if the premises are compliant, your Business License will be issued within 21 working days.
- If there are any outstanding matters, the business license will only be issued once all issues have been addressed.

5. Application process: Spaza Shops

 An application to operate a spaza shop must be made in terms of the Langeberg Land Use Planning Bylaw, 2015 and the Langeberg Integrated Zoning Scheme By-law, 2018. Applications are assessed in terms of all relevant legislation and policies and, on the basis thereof, the Langeberg Municipal Planning Tribunal or the authorised employee may decide to approve or refuse an application.

- Application forms are available from the Town Planning Department and an application fee, as stipulated in the tariff list, is payable upon submission of the application. The application fee is not refundable if the application is refused.
- The owner must submit the application to • operate the spaza shop to the Town Planning Department. To enable an application to be processed, the application form must be FULLY completed with all supporting documents, site plan, proof of ownership / authorisation by owner, copies of ID documents and the prescribed application fee. Incomplete applications will be returned to the applicant by post. No application may be made for a spaza shop on a site which is still in the ownership of the municipality or the state.
- The application must be advertised, and written • notices must be sent to surrounding property owners identified by the Town Planning Department, for their comments. Proof of such notification will be recorded by the Town Planning Department. Alternatively, applicants may get the written consent from surrounding property owners, listed as affected properties, themselves. This list and the pro-forma Neighbour's Consent Form shall be provided by the municipality upon request. In addition, a standard notice must be displayed on the premises for the duration of the advertising period. The notice must provide complete information relating to the applicant's proposed spaza shop and must state that any objections may be made to the Municipality within the specified period.

- The Town Planning Department must send information regarding the application to the Health Department, the Building Inspectorate, the applicable Ward Committee and SAPS, or alternatively arrange a site inspection with such parties present.
- The Health Department, Building Inspectorate, Ward Committee, and SAPS must, in response, send a report to the Town Planning Department regarding the investigation, compliance with the relevant legislation, and their recommendations.
- The Town Planning Department must also conduct an on-site inspection and prepare a report and recommendation.
- The application must be considered by the Langeberg Municipal Planning Tribunal, or the authorised employee as applicable. Each application must be evaluated on merit, with specific regard to the requirements outlined in the Langeberg Spaza Shop Policy.
- The applicant must be informed of the decision in writing. The approval by the Langeberg Municipality for a spaza shop will only apply to the property owner, whilst the person who operates the spaza shop should be the owner him/herself or a family member / legal tenant residing on the property in possession of a valid South African I.D. document. In the case where the property owner and / or employees are not South African citizens, a valid work permit must be presented and recorded on file.
- A complete record of all applications and decisions regarding spaza shops must be kept by the Town Planning Department.

HOW TO REGISTER ON THE EPWP DATABASE

EPWP offers short-term and medium-termwork opportunities for those who are unemployed or unskilled.

- People with disabilities are encouraged to register.
- Simply submit the application form with a copy of your South African ID document at your nearest municipal office.

Human Rights Month is commemorated in March to remind South Africans about the sacrifices that accompanied the struggle for the attainment of democracy in South Africa. Human Rights Day on 21 March falls within this period.

The month of March is a heightened period in South Africa to mark Human Rights Month, commemorated under the theme, "Three Decades of Respect for and Promotion of Human Rights".

The 1960s were characterised by systematic defiance and protest against apartheid and racism across the country. On 21 March 1960, the community of Sharpeville and Langa townships, like their fellow compatriots across the country, embarked on a protest march to protest against pass laws. The apartheid police shot and killed 69 of the protesters at Sharpeville, many of them shot while fleeing. Many other people were killed in other parts of the country. The tragedy came to be known as the Sharpeville Massacre and it exposed the apartheid government's deliberate violation of human rights to the world.

The democratic government declared 21 March Human Rights Day to commemorate and honour those who fought for our liberation and the rights we enjoy today.

Our <u>Constitution</u> is hailed as one of the most progressive in the world. The Constitution is the ultimate protector of our Human Rights, which were previously denied to the majority of our people under Apartheid. We commemorate Human Rights Day to reinforce our commitment to the <u>Bill of Rights</u> as enshrined in our Constitution.

These rights include:

- Equality everyone is equal before the law and has the right to equal protection and benefit of the law.
- Human dignity everyone has inherent dignity and have their dignity respected and protected.
- Freedom of movement and residence everyone has a right to freedom of movement and to reside anywhere in the country.
- Language and culture everyone has the right to use the language and to participate in the cultural life of their choice.
- Life everyone has the right to life.

Whether we are at the workplace, within communities, at schools, or with our partners and children, we all need to demonstrate the kind of responsibility that we would like to see in our country's future.

We call on all South Africans to use Human Rights Month to foster greater social cohesion, nation-building and a shared national identity. It is our duty as a nation to strive for inclusive socio-economic development while ensuring that we combat scourges such as racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and all related intolerances as well as gender-based violence and femicide, which are undermining our human rights culture.





YOUR PREPAID METER WILL STOP WORKING IF NOT UPDATED BEFORE 24 NOVEMBER 2024

All prepaid electricity meters in South Africa must be configured to accept the new tokens that will be generated after the Token ID (TID) Rollover on 24 November 2024.

If your prepaid meter is not updated by 24 November 2024, you will be left without access to electricity.

Langeberg Municipality has appointed Syntell, who are currently going from door-to-door to assist all households and businesses with this software configuration.

We urge all households to please cooperate in this initiative by allowing authorized Syntell officials access to your electrical meter, so that the meter continues to work after 24 November 2024 until 2045.

LAW ENFORCEMENT IN LANGEBERG



Law Enforcement Officers play a crucial role in maintaining order and safety in our communities. In the Langeberg municipal area, there are six Law Enforcement Officers who are responsible for enforcing the Langeberg Municipality's by-laws. These officers work tirelessly to ensure that citizens are abiding to by-laws and regulations put in place to ensure effective service delivery and cooperative communities.

Law Enforcement Officers also work closely with different government organisations, such as the South African Police Service. By collaborating with other organizations, they can effectively address issues related to crime and public safety.

Our by-laws provide procedures, methods and practices to regulate issues around selling liquor, informal trading, municipal land use planning, integrated zoning scheme like operating a business in a residential area, supply of electricity, supply of irrigation water, use of sewerage and sanitation services, utilization of streets, noise complaints, keeping of animals, pound use, control of cemeteries, hosting of events, use of public amenities, and the preservation of the environment like air quality and integrated waste management to mention a few.

The top complaints reported to Law Enforcement Officers is about Illegal Hawkers. These are people who sell goods on the street without a permit, which is against the law.

Law enforcement officers have the power to confiscate goods, issue compliance notices and fines, and shut down illegal operations where by-laws are infringed upon. Their functions and responsibilities are varied, and they must have certain requirements and skills to effectively serve their communities.

Their functions and responsibilities are varied and include maintaining safety and security through the application of laid-down policing, protection, and rescue procedures, attending to processes aimed at ensuring compliance with by-laws, and regulations. laws, Law Enforcement Officers also attend to documentation and notification procedures, serving of summons, compliance orders, executing warrants of arrest, and preparing statements.

They undertake specific activities during disasters and emergency situations, complete specific reports, statutory documentation, and registers, and attend to the application of specific maintenance sequences with respect to equipment and vehicles. It is important for law enforcement officers to keep abreast of the latest legislative changes, developments, and emerging trends in the profession to effectively serve their communities.
