MESSAGE FROM THE MUNICIPAL MANAGER

MUNICIPAL MANAGER OF LANGEBERG MUNICIPALITY: MR DP LUBBE

The holidays may be a distant memory, but as this is our first newsletter for 2025, I'd like to welcome all of my colleagues back after a well-deserved break! I hope you had a good time and got enough rest.

We have jumped right back into the swing of things, as each directorate has presented their business plans for consideration when drafting the 2025-2026 Budget. The 2023-2024 Annual Performance Report has completed its public engagement process and was approved at the statutory council meeting in January. It is now available on the municipal website. While the mid-year report on our progress during the first half of the financial year has been finalised, you can read a summary elsewhere in this newsletter.

Mr Ayanda Mati, our Chief Audit Executive, has taken on the responsibility to temporarily fill the position of Acting CFO to ensure the smooth operation of the Finance Directorate. While Mr Donald Engelbrecht will act in the position as Chief Audit Executive.

Langeberg Municipality has introduced Level 1 water restrictions in Robertson starting from February 1st as a proactive measure to ensure water conservation.

Factors Contributing to the Current Water Restrictions in Robertson

The water levels at Dassieshoek and Koos Kok Dams have decreased significantly, with levels recorded at 29% and 30% respectively as of 26 January 2025. This is in sharp contrast to the 100% levels observed at the same time last year.

As a result of exceptionally low rainfall, the period from August to December 2024 experienced the lowest rainfall in the last five years. This lack of sufficient rainfall directly impacted the inflow to the dams, resulting in reduced water reserves.

While temperatures rose, irrigation needs increased, and households used more water throughout the holiday season, In December 2024, water usage increased by 27% compared to December 2023.

Annual maintenance of the Robertson (Brandvlei) irrigation canal in August 2024 during which no water could be pumped, and the supply of water to farmers according to agreements, further strained our water sources.

We call on all residents of the Langeberg area to please make every possible effort to reduce water use and save our precious resource.

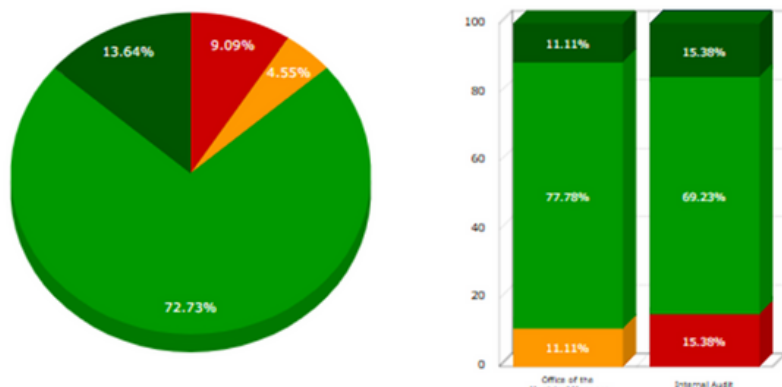

- The bar chart on the right provides a breakdown of progress by department within each directorate.

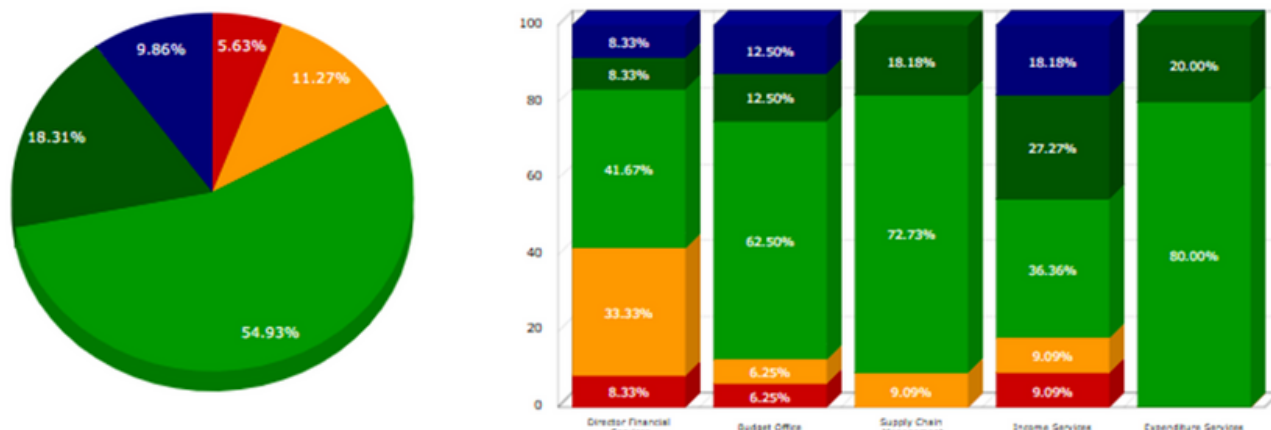

TOP 10 CAPITAL EXPENDITURE PROJECTS **UPDATE**

Capital projects are identified through the Integrated Development Planning (IDP) public participation process and prioritized based on community needs and available resources. For the 2024/2025 financial year, the Langeberg Municipality has allocated a total budget of R118,426,599 to upgrade and enhance infrastructure within the municipal area. Below is an update on the progress of the top 10 projects identified in the 2024/2025 Budget Plan.

UPGRADE ROBERTSON WASTE WATER TREATMENT WORKS



Project Status: The Contractor is busy with installation of electrical and mechanical works. Road and wall construction is ongoing.
Contractor: T41/2023 awarded to Hiload Inyanga Construction Company (Pty) Ltd.
Value: R100 124 052.65 (VAT inclusive)
Location: Robertson
Commencement Date: 18 January 2023
Expected Completion Date: December 2025

INSTALL CHLORINATION SYSTEM AT ALL WWTW AND WTW

Project Status: The 70 kg cylinders, which were previously in short supply, are now back in stock. As a result, there is no longer a need to upgrade to a 1-ton chlorine gas dosing system. The allocated funds will be reallocated to the Robertson Wastewater Treatment Works project in the adjustment budget request.

ASHTON ROAD UPGRADES AT ALWYN ST, INDUSTRIAL AREA AND ZOLANI

Project Status: Tender phase
Contractor: Tender 46/2024: Construction for the Upgrading of Various Roads in Ashton and Montagu.
Budget: R 9 000 000
Location: Alwyn Street, Industrial road upgrade, and curbing in various streets in Ashton.
Commencement Date: To be confirmed.

PURCHASE DIGGER LOADERS



Project Status: Five new digger loaders have been purchased and are currently in use for daily operations, including road and pavement repairs, water pipe burst repairs, and stormwater channel cleaning.
Contractor: Tender Transversal Contract RT57-2022 – Supply and delivery of sedans, light and heavy commercial vehicles, buses, motorcycles, agricultural tractors, construction plant, and equipment to the state for the period 1 July 2023 – 30 June 2026.
Tender Value: R915,894.17 each (excluding VAT)
Location: Ashton, Bonnievale, McGregor, Montagu, and Robertson
Commencement Date: 2 September 2024

INSTALL BROADBAND, WIFI AND TELECOMMUNICATION CONNECTIVITY



Project Status: The project experienced delays due to the transversal procurement process. However, a service provider has now been appointed to roll out a fibre network within the municipal network to optimize and stabilize connectivity. The project commenced on 4 February 2025 with readiness assessments, followed by the rollout of fibre cabling and connectivity across the municipal network. This will establish a backbone network infrastructure that enables public Wi-Fi expansion and supports the long-anticipated VoIP telephone system. Ultimately, this project will contribute to a Connected Langeberg, serving as a foundational element of the Smart City initiative, aimed at fostering interconnected, integrated, and digitized service delivery.

LEVEL 1 WATER RESTRICTIONS FOR ROBERTSON

Starting 1 February 2025, Level 1 water restrictions have been implemented in Robertson, as per the [Langeberg Municipal Drought Management Policy](#), to ensure a sustainable water supply. The very low levels of storage dams in Robertson, as a result of the low rainfall, excessive high daily temperatures and increased water consumption over the summer months, necessitate the urgent implementation of water restrictions in Robertson.

Special 2024-2025 water tariffs in respect of water restrictions will be implemented from your next meter reading and billing cycle which will take effect from 01 February 2025.

Water restrictions

Suspension of Leiwater: Effective from Monday, 3 February 2025. Consumers will be notified once irrigation water is reinstated.

1. Garden Watering:

- Watering may only be done for two hours per day between 18:00 – 20:00, on two days per week.
- Even-numbered street addresses: Mondays and Thursdays (18:00 – 20:00).
- Odd-numbered street addresses: Tuesdays and Fridays (18:00 – 20:00).

2. Sports Facilities:

- Only cricket pitches, golf course greens, and bowling greens may be watered for two hours per day, twice per week, unless using a private water source.

3. Prohibited Uses:

- No hosing of roofs, driveways, or vehicles with a garden hose.
- Restrictions do not apply to full-time commercial car wash businesses.

4. Excessive Use Penalty:

- A 50% rate increase will apply to residential properties consuming more than 30 kiloliters per month.
- A 10% tariff increase will be charged to non-residential consumers exceeding usage limits.

5. Indigent Households:

- Indigent households should contact Langeberg Municipality for leakage repairs.

6. Non-Compliance Penalties:

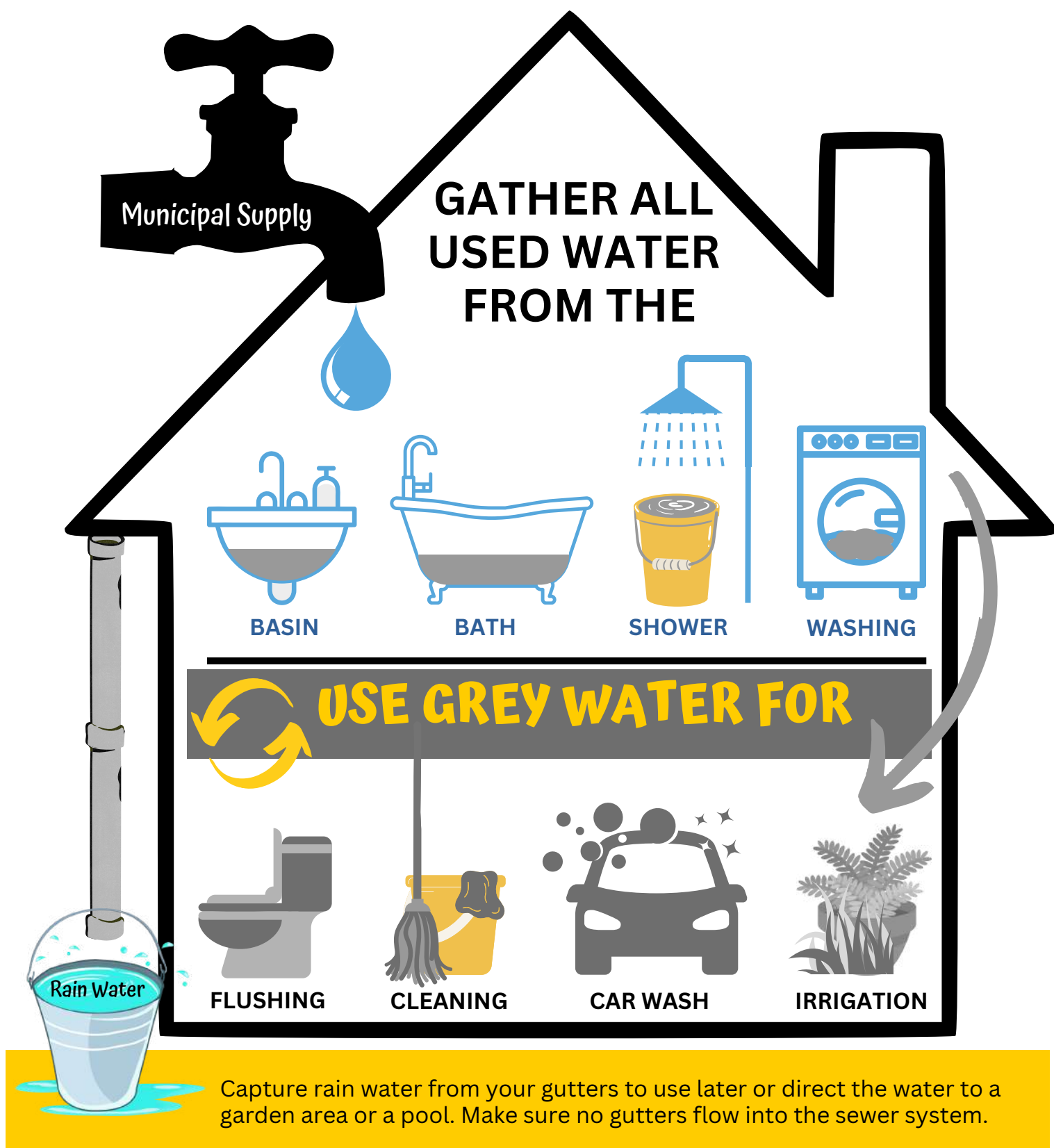
- Consumers found guilty of violating the Drought Management Policy or failing to comply with compliance notices issued by an authorized official may face:
 - A fine of R3,709.17, or
 - Up to three years imprisonment, or
 - Both fines and imprisonment.

TAKE CONTROL OF YOUR MUNICIPAL METER READINGS

Water meters measure the volume of water used by residential and commercial buildings. They play a crucial role in preserving this invaluable resource. Various types of meters are available, each essential for monitoring water usage, detecting leaks, and managing costs. Therefore, accurate readings are vital. Property owners have the responsibility to ensure that water meters are easily accessible and kept clean to facilitate accurate readings.

If the municipality is unable to read your meter—due to a locked gate or other reasons—and you do not submit your water reading, your bill will be estimated based on your previous months consumption. Any cost estimates will be adjusted when we receive an actual reading.

PROCESS COST ESTIMATES

The purpose of water estimation is to ensure consumers are billed for the services they have used when their properties cannot be accessed. This estimation is based on the average consumption from previous months.

ENSURE AN ACCURATE WATER METER READING BY FOLLOWING THESE STEPS:

1. Know where your water meter is located.
2. Ensure that it is not obstructed by sand, weeds, or other debris for easy reading.
3. Always keep your water meter accessible to our officials.

If your water meter is behind locked gates or if dogs prevent our meter readers from accessing it, you can submit the reading yourself.

HOW IT WORKS

Submit and keep record of your water meter readings via the My Municipal Meters app.

1. [Click here to download the My Municipal Meters app.](#)
2. Register with your cell number/ email address.
3. Select "Langeberg Municipality" as your Service Provider.
4. Enter your Municipal Account number.
5. Select the meter number, take a photo of the meter on the same day each month, enter the reading and submit. (DO NOT enter decimal digits)

PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING

- You may submit up to two readings per meter every month.
- All Meter readings are taken on the same day each month and submitted on or before the 10th of each month.
- Meter readings received after the 10th of each month will be processed with the next month's billing cycle.

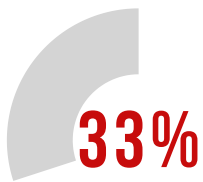


LANGEBERG MUNICIPAL DAM LEVELS: 31 JANUARY 2025

LEVEL 1 WATER RESTRICTIONS IN ROBERTSON

DRAFT BY-LAW FOR TOWNSHIP ECONOMIES OPEN FOR COMMENTS

Notice is hereby given in terms of section 21(a) of the Local Government: Municipal Systems Act 32 of 2000. Members of the public are hereby invited to comment on the Langeberg Municipality's DRAFT BY-LAW FOR TOWNSHIP ECONOMIES.

The Draft By-Law for Township Economies has been developed in response to the need for a regulatory framework that promotes inclusive economic development within townships.

This initiative aligns with sections 152(1) and 153(a) of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996, which mandate municipalities to promote social and economic development.

The key objectives of the Draft By-Law are to :

- Facilitate inclusive spatial and economic development in townships.
- Harmonize the township ecosystem and provide norms and standards for the establishment and management of township-based enterprises, both formal and informal.
- Raise awareness of applicable laws and regulations affecting township businesses.
- Support small businesses to grow and participate in mainstream economic activities.

The Draft By-Law includes several important provisions, such as:

- Freedom to engage in business activities with the necessary permits.
- Designation of business areas and sites to promote inclusive economic development.
- Issuing and management of business permits.
- Proactive steps by the municipality to support township businesses, including capacity building and access to infrastructure and markets.
- Registration and permitting processes for business activities.
- Prohibitions and restrictions to ensure orderly business operations.
- Hygiene and waste removal standards.
- Enforcement mechanisms and penalties for non-compliance.

Any comments or objections in respect of the draft by-law must be submitted in writing to the Municipal Manager on or before 14 February 2025 (Allowing 60 days or more from the date of publication of this notice).

- Be married or habitually cohabit with a long-term partner
- Be single and have financial dependents
- Earn between R0-R3500 gross income per month per household. Person earning more than R 3500 to a maximum of R22 000 per household can register for Finance Linked Subsidies
- Never received a government subsidy for housing before
- Never owned a property

WASTE MATERIAL RECOVERY FACILITY (MRF) ACHIEVES REMARKABLE MILESTONE



As part of Langeberg Municipality's commitment to sustainability and environmental responsibility, the R19 million Waste Material Recovery Facility (MRF) was opened in May 2024. In just nine months, the facility has already delivered a high return on investment, generating R1,019,320.00 through the sorting, baling, and sale of recyclable materials—a remarkable achievement!

The revenue generated is reinvested into the municipal budget, addressing critical infrastructure and service delivery priorities identified in the Municipality's Integrated Development Plan (IDP).

Since its inception, the MRF has created 26 jobs, including 24 temporary general workers, one temporary supervisor, and one forklift operator. This dedicated team, together with the support of our community in providing household and business recyclables, has enabled Langeberg Municipality to sort and bale over 982.86 tons of recyclable materials since May 2024, far exceeding the initial target of 100 tons per month.

As a municipality, we are committed to reducing, reusing, and recycling waste to minimize the amount of waste reaching our landfill sites. The reality is that waste disposal facilities across South Africa, including ours, are rapidly reaching capacity. Through continued recycling efforts, we aim to extend the lifespan of our landfill sites and promote a cleaner, more sustainable future for all.

Since building new landfill sites is neither sustainable nor environmentally feasible, the new MRF, along with other waste minimization initiatives, marks a significant step toward preserving our environment and maximizing landfill capacity for future generations.

The MRF is located next to the transfer station on Abattoir Weg in Ashton and serves as a public drop-off point for the entire Langeberg Municipality, where residents can bring all recyclable materials.

Additionally, the municipality collects recyclables from households and businesses on designated waste collection days. These recyclables are then transported to the MRF for sorting, baling, and distribution to companies that use them as raw materials for manufacturing new products. Properly sorted recyclables have greater value and are widely accepted in the thriving recycling industry.

To make this initiative even more successful, we need your recyclable materials! Getting started is simple:

1. Pick up a free clear plastic bag from your local municipal office.
2. Fill the bag with paper, cardboard, plastic, tin, and glass waste (please rinse items before placing them in the bag).
3. No need to put out recyclables every week—only place the full bag outside on your pavement, on top of or next to your wheelie bin, on waste collection days.
4. In exchange, a new clear bag will be left at your home for your next batch of recyclables.

ILLEGAL DUMPING IS A CRIMINAL OFFENCE

Langeberg Municipality urges all residents to take a stand against illegal dumping to protect our environment and community. Dumping waste illegally harms our surroundings and leads to high cleanup costs, which ultimately burden taxpayers.

What Is Illegal Dumping?

Illegal dumping happens when people discard waste in open spaces, on sidewalks, or in stormwater channels instead of using proper disposal sites. This practice destroys plant and animal life, contaminates soil, and worsens our already limited water supply.

How You Can Make a Difference

- Dispose of waste responsibly by using legal dumping sites.
- Keep waste with you until you can dispose of it properly.

Teach the Next Generation

Parents play a key role in raising awareness. Teach children early that littering is not only harmful but also against the law. Cleaner neighbourhoods mean healthier, happier communities for everyone.

Hold Offenders Accountable

Langeberg Municipality's Law Enforcement Unit investigates illegal dumping and issues penalties. If you provide details about an offender, such as their identity or evidence of their actions, the municipality can act. Fines for illegal dumping range from R1,500.00 to R3,000.00, depending on the case.

Report Illegal Dumping

Illegal dumping often goes unnoticed because it isn't reported. Together, we can change that. If you spot someone dumping waste unlawfully:

- Write down key details, such as their address or vehicle registration number.
- Take photos as evidence, if it's safe to do so.
- Report incidents to Langeberg Municipality's 24/7 Emergency Call Centre at 0860 88 1111 or email complaints@langeberg.gov.za.

By disposing of waste responsibly and reporting incidents, you're helping create a cleaner, safer Langeberg. Let's work together to protect our environment and improve our quality of life.

SEPARATE RECYCLABLES FROM YOUR WASTE



PAPER

Newspapers, magazines, books, cardboard, white paper, envelopes, junk mail, notes.

NOT SUITABLE FOR RECYCLING:

- Any wet, smelly soiled material.
- Chemically treated paper like old faxes and heat sensitive items.
- Used paper towels and serviettes, wax paper, ply- or plastic-coated glossy paper, milk/juice cartons.



METAL

Aluminium, food containers, cooldrink cans, bottle caps, steel and copper.

NOT SUITABLE FOR RECYCLING:

- Any wet, smelly soiled material.
- Metal paper fasteners
- Tin Foil and cling wrap plastic
- Batteries



PLASTIC

Cleaned plastic bottles, bags, containers and packaging.

NOT SUITABLE FOR RECYCLING:

- Any wet, smelly soiled material.
- Toothpaste tubes
- Cling wrap / Cellophane
- Rubber bands
- Polystyrene / Styrofoam
- Nylon, clothing or shoes



GLASS

Cleaned tinted glass and transparent glass

NOT SUITABLE FOR RECYCLING:

- Safety glass
- Laminated glass
- Light bulbs and neon tubes
- Crockery, pottery, plates, cups etc.



ORGANIC WASTE

Leftover food scraps, vegetable and fruit peels etc. should not go into your clear recycle bag but can be kept and taken to pig farmers or used as compost in the garden.

- 1 Keep your recyclable waste, e.g. plastics, tins, paper, cardboard and glass separate.
- 2 Rinse recyclable containers and place it in the clear refuse bag that is provided by Langeberg Municipality at no cost. Collect your free bag at your nearest municipal office.
- 3 When your clear bag is full, place it on the pavement by 07:45 on refuse collection days. Or bring clean recyclable materials to the Ashton Material Recovery Facility during operating hours.

IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR SPAZA SHOP OWNERS

Attention all Spaza shop owners in our area! We have important information regarding your recent business license applications.

Application Status

Many of you have received letters indicating that your business licence applications were not considered. Please be advised that you must apply for land use approval and building plan approval from the Langeberg Municipal Town Planning Department BEFORE you can submit a Business License Application Form.

Application Process for land use and building plan approval

Spaza shop applications in Langeberg Municipality are evaluated in terms of the Langeberg Spaza Policy, April 2015 (Council Resolution A3108) which includes the following: Ownership and Structure: The spaza shop must be operated by the property owner, a family member, or a legal tenant residing on the property.

The structure must be authorized and enhance the residential neighbourhood without compromising safety, welfare, or aesthetics. No application may be made for a spaza shop on a site which is in the ownership of the municipality or the State.

Application Completeness: The application must be fully completed with all supporting documents, including a site plan, proof of ownership, copies of ID documents, and the prescribed application fee.

Advertising and Notification: The application must be advertised, and written notices must be sent to surrounding property owners for their comments. Proof of such notification must be recorded.

Health and Building Compliance: The application must be reviewed by the District Health Inspectorate, Building Inspectorate, Ward Committee, and SAPS. These entities must provide reports on compliance with relevant legislation and their recommendations.

Site Inspection: The Town Planning Department must conduct an on-site inspection and prepare a report and recommendation.

Municipal Decision: The application is considered by the Municipality, with specific regard to the requirements outlined in Sections 4 and 5 of the Council policy.

Merit-Based Evaluation, the evaluation includes:

- The floor area of the spaza shop must not exceed 25m² or 30% of the total floor area of all approved buildings on the property.
- The dominant use and appearance of the property must remain residential. The spaza shop must not negatively impact surrounding properties.
- The owner of the business must live on site.
- Operating hours are restricted between 07:00 and 21:00.
- The location must be desirable and not within 400m of other business-zoned sites or existing spaza shops unless in a defined economic zone.
- Health Requirements: The spaza shop must meet health requirements, including adequate ventilation and illumination, and must not open directly onto a bedroom or toilet.

Final Decision: The applicant is informed of the decision in writing, and a complete record of all applications and decisions is kept by the Town Planning Department. Applications may be refused for non-compliance with these requirements, lack of desirability of the proposed use, adverse impact on safety and welfare, or negative impact on existing rights.

Spaza shops which open without Council approval are illegal, and the owner and operator are liable to be prosecuted. Residents must ensure that they purchase only from spaza shops which have Council-approval, and which display their business licence as well as their health certificate (Certificate of Acceptability) from the Cape Winelands District Municipality.

Food Safety FAQs

1. Have there been any pesticide-related incidents in the Cape Winelands District Municipal area?

No confirmed pesticide-related incidents have been found. While several cases were reported, investigations showed none were due to exposure to poisonous chemicals or unsafe foods.



2. What is the difference between food and chemical poisoning?

The cause of the sad passing of 23 children in other provinces was due to ingestion of poisonous chemicals could have contaminated foodstuffs.

- **Food Poisoning:** Illness from ingesting spoiled food due to bacterial contamination, incorrect storage, or poor temperature control.
- **Chemical Poisoning:** Illness from ingesting food contaminated with chemicals like pesticides or household cleaners. This can happen through direct ingestion or cross-contamination.



3. How do pesticides get into the food?

Illegal pesticides are often repackaged into smaller, unlabeled containers by informal traders and sold to residents for pest control. These pesticides get into the food when stored incorrectly or near consumable products like chips or biscuits.

- **Direct Ingestion:** Chemicals can be ingested directly if stored in containers mistaken for safe, like coldrink bottles.
- **Cross-Contamination:** Food can be contaminated if handlers don't wash hands after using pesticides.
- **Vaporization:** Hazardous chemicals can vaporize in warm temperatures and contaminate food or water.
- **Accidental Spillage:** Spills of hazardous chemicals can contaminate food and water.



4. How should I avoid chemical poisoning and/or accidental ingestion?

- Store food and hazardous chemicals separately.
- Keep chemicals out of children's reach and clearly labeled.
- Avoid using food containers for storing chemicals.



5. What pesticides are responsible for the illness/deaths in children?

- **Terbufos:** An organophosphate classified as a "Highly Hazardous Pesticide." It caused the latest 6 deaths. It's meant for formal agricultural use but is sometimes sold illegally for domestic pest control.
- **Aldicarb (Two Step):** Banned since 2016, but still found in the informal market.



6. What should people do to avoid buying contaminated foods?

Always buy food from registered shops who have the required certificate of acceptability (COA), keep their shop clean and neat and have clearly marked products.

To avoid chemical contamination, people should:

- Purchase pesticides that are correctly stored and clearly marked.
- Ensure the pesticide has instructions for use and is approved for domestic use.
- Choose the appropriate pesticide for the specific pest infestation.

There are safer pesticides available that are still effective against pests.



7. What is the CWDM's Municipal Health Services doing to ensure the safety of food in the district?

The Cape Winelands District Municipality (CWDM) employs nearly 50 Environmental Health Practitioners (EHPs) as inspectors. These EHPs are responsible for ensuring that health and food standards are maintained.

Their duties include:

- Regulating food premises.
- Monitoring compliance of these premises, including foodstuffs and date markings.

In essence, EHPs conduct inspections of various retailers, manufacturers, and producers to ensure that the required standards for safe food conditions are maintained in the Cape Winelands.



8. Are the authorities sure that these incidences of illness and death are not because of spoiled food?

Yes, investigations confirmed that the illnesses and deaths were due to pesticide ingestion, not spoiled food.

The pesticides were improperly stored and could of contaminated items bought by the children.

No such incidents occurred in the Cape Winelands District.



9. What is the difference between best before, sell by, and use by?

Best Before: Indicates the date until which the product will be at its best quality if stored correctly. It can still be safe to consume after this date, and it is legal to sell products past this date if consumers are informed.

Sell By: The date after which the product should not be sold, but it may still be safe to consume for a reasonable period if stored properly. Commonly used for highly perishable items like milk.

Use By: The date after which the product should not be sold or consumed. It is illegal to sell products past this date.

Date markings help consumers make informed choices about the safety and quality of food. Consumers should also ensure proper transport and storage of purchased foods and use discretion before consumption.



10. What is a certificate of acceptability (COA) and do all businesses have on in the CWD?

A COA certifies that food premises meet basic hygiene standards for food handling. It is required by law for anyone handling food on these premises, with some exemptions. Remember that a COA is NOT registration with the local municipality.

The COA states that the premises is suitable for the handling, preparation or production of certain foodstuffs.

In the CWD all the shops (formal and informal traders) that meet regulatory requirements, get a Certificate of Acceptability (COA) once the EHP has inspected and approved of their facility. These shops are routinely and spontaneously inspected to ensure compliance.

STRAY ANIMALS

Cattle can often be seen roaming right next to main roads in and around Langeberg, grazing scarily close to incoming and outgoing traffic. This has sparked a debate which now has everyone guessing: who is responsible for stray animals?

Western Cape Department of Local Government decided to create a By-Law on this subject. A complication with the implementation of the By-Law and the ruling of the Constitutional Court is the fact that most stray animals are not branded. This makes it difficult to identify the owner/s and to give proper notices as envisaged in the By-Law.

The Agricultural Act requires that animals must be branded. The enforcement of this legislation is vital in the management of stray animals. It is with these provisions in mind that the municipality maintains that the management of stray animals is a complicated matter and requires full cooperation from the other spheres of government.

According to Langeberg Pounds By-Law, Chapter 3: the following applies when considering the seizure of animals for impoundment:

- A lost, abandoned, stray or trespassing animal, or an animal that is not kept under proper control by its owner, and that is found in a public place or on private land, may be seized and delivered to a pound for impoundment.
- In the case of an animal that is found in a public place, the following persons may seize the animal: member of SAPS; member of the SANDF; law enforcement officer or the provincial department responsible for road traffic matters; an authorised official of the municipality; a

pound keeper; an employee of any Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals located in the Province; or any other person determined by the municipality from time to time. In the case of an animal that is found on private land, the animal may be seized by the owner or occupier of that land. Alternatively, one of the authorised officials may seize the animal too.

The person who seizes the animal must deliver it to the nearest accessible pound, taking the shortest practical route and within the shortest practical time. The owner of the animal will be held liable for costs incurred by ratepayers.

However, the owner will be given seven days to dispute those fees and reasonable expenses. A pound keeper must, within seven days of the impoundment of an animal, notify the owner.

A statement should also be issued by the pound keeper to the owner stating that he or she has seven days, calculated from a date stipulated in the notice, to dispute those fees and reasonable expenses. If the owner does not dispute the fees and reasonable expenses, but fails to pay by the given date, the pound keeper will then apply to a magistrate's court for an order authorising him or her (pound keeper) to sell the animal.

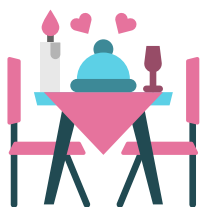

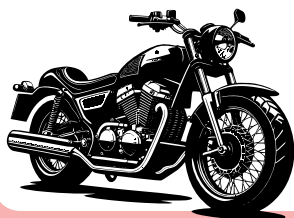

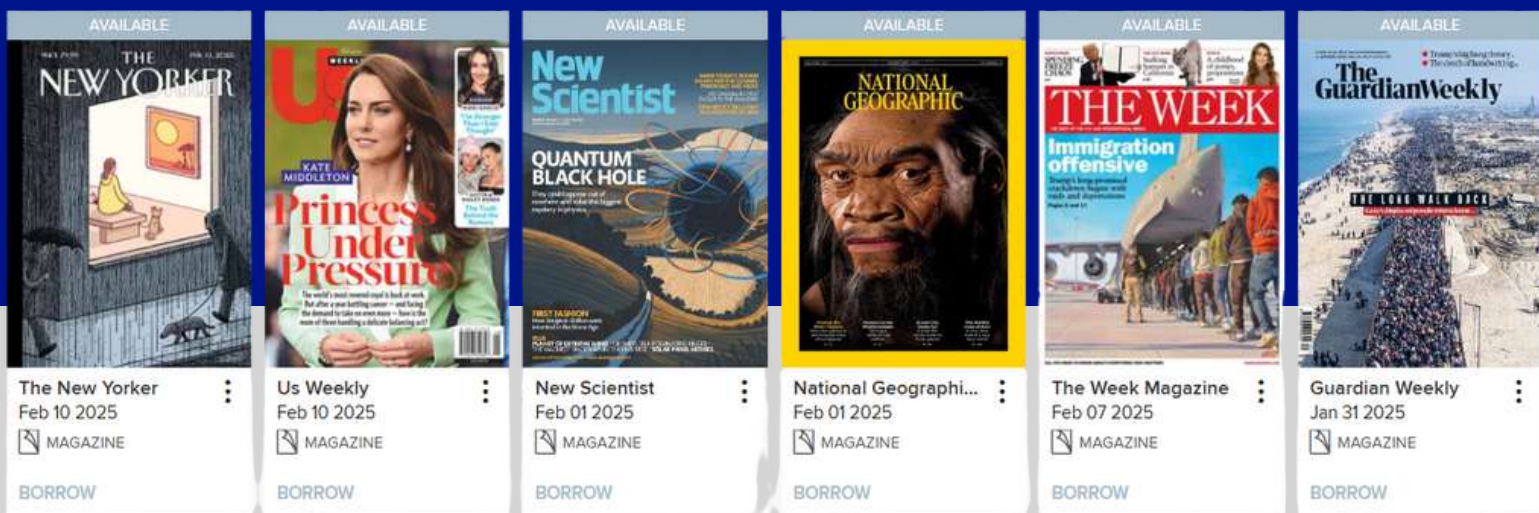
