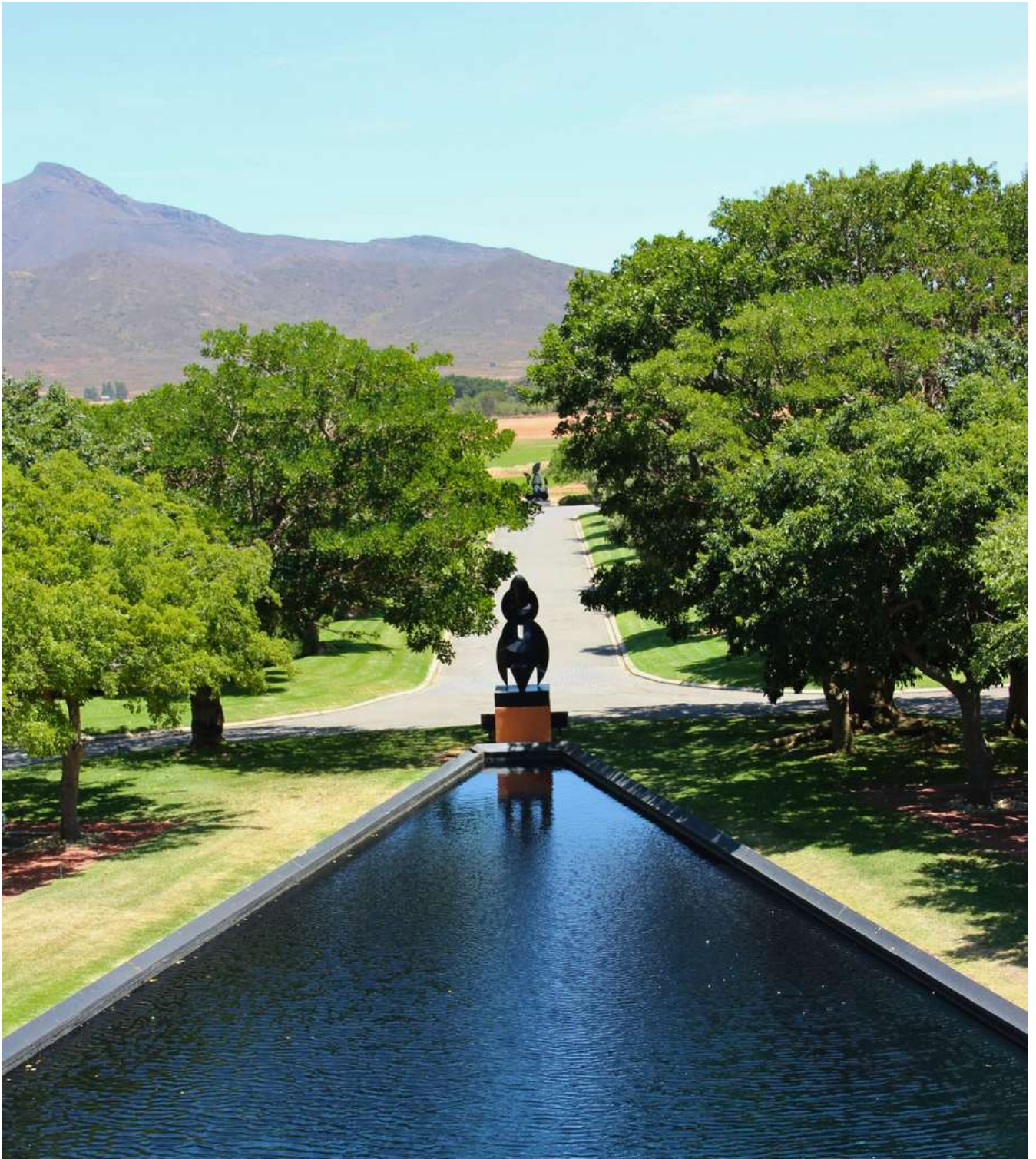

MESSAGE FROM THE MUNICIPAL MANAGER

MUNICIPAL MANAGER OF LANGEBERG MUNICIPALITY: MR DP LUBBE

Warm Greetings to all Residents of and Visitors to the Langeberg Municipal area!

The month of March is specifically a very busy month in respect of the review of the Integrated Development Plan and the compilation of the draft Budget for the 2025/26 financial year, commencing 1 July 2025 as well as the two MTREF outer years of 2026/27 and 2027/28. Both these strategic products, the draft IDP Review and the draft Budget need to be submitted to the Langeberg Municipal Council by 31 March 2025.

That said, for the first time, we had to compile a draft budget for the municipality, without knowing what the specific allocations from National Government are towards provinces and municipalities, as the National Budget was not approved originally and the date was set for 12 March 2025, to have a second attempt by the National Minister of Finance to have the National Budget approved.

The implication of this delay is that our own Western Cape Province will only be in a position to consider and approve the Western Cape Provincial Budget on 28 March 2025.

For Langeberg Municipality to conform to legislative compliance deadlines, we will have to rely on estimates in respect of grant funding from National- and Provincial Government to prepare our draft budget in time for end of March 2025.

The accurate and specific figures of grant allocations will be timeously included into the final 2025/26 budget to be tabled to Council by end of May 2025.

March 2025 also sees the final preparation of the calendar, time schedules as well as the preparation of presentations on the progress made by the Langeberg Municipality within its twelve wards, when representatives of the municipality will visit each ward to report back to the community of each ward on progress made with IDP and Budget priorities for the existing financial year, as well as to determine what existing priorities might have changed or new priorities that have come to the fore during the new financial year.

It is necessary to understand the unique positions of local municipalities within the Annual IDP Process. Local municipalities, such as Langeberg Municipality is at the so-called "coal face" in terms of infrastructure development and service delivery, often referred to as "government closest to the people". During the IDP ward sessions, community representatives express their various needs within their respective wards, and more than often most of the needs expressed do not fall within the legislative responsibility of the local municipality.

Examples of some of such needs are the establishment of clinics and hospitals, ambulance services, establishment of primary- and secondary schools, establishment of police stations and mobile police stations, etc. Although all these requests are not the functional responsibility of the municipality, these important needs are recorded by the municipality during its IDP process and elevated to the relevant authority responsible i.e. the Cape Winelands District Municipality, the responsible Western Cape Provincial Department, or the responsible National Department, or Parastatal. This is done through the intergovernmental Relations (IGR) Framework and Support Steering Committee.

MESSAGE FROM THE MUNICIPAL MANAGER

On March 2025, the Executive Mayor and myself attended the Western Cape Premier's Co-ordinating Forum (PCF) meeting in Stellenbosch. All 30 municipalities are invited to attend this meeting on a regular basis, where one of the main topics for discussion, is always the "State of Local Government in the Western Cape Province".

As a result, the Auditor General of South Africa (AGSA), delivered the presentation on the audit outcomes for 2023/24 financial year. In the Western Cape, 20 out of 30 municipalities achieved an unqualified audit without any matters, commonly called a "clean audit". We are proud and sincerely grateful that we were able to, once again for 6 consecutive years, achieve a clean audit outcome for the 2023/24 financial year.

Also at the PCF meeting, Western Cape Provincial Treasury delivered a presentation called the 2023/24 Western Cape Local Government Budget Performance Review. In terms of the Western Cape Municipalities 2023/24 Financial Performance Overview, the Langeberg Municipality achieved a consistent "green score" throughout in terms of Operating Revenue: 95,3%, Operating Expenditure: 96.3% and Capital Expenditure: 95,5%.

In so far as the Budget Funding Position, of Western Cape Municipalities is concerned, the Langeberg Municipality received a consistent "green score" throughout for the consecutive financial years from 2020/21 to 2024/25 in respect of its Tabled Budget, Adopted Budget and Adjustment Budget.

It is important to note that a municipal budget must be funded in terms of Section 18 of the Municipal Finance Management Act (MFMA) before a Municipal Council can adopt it for implementation. A funded budget is a budget that is funded by a combination of cash derived from realistically anticipated revenues to be collected in that year, as well as cash backed surpluses of previous years.

On the topic of Climate Change, we received a most informative presentation at the PCF. The three most important indicators for Western Cape municipalities and specifically for Langeberg Municipality can be shortly summarized as follows:

1. Pro-longed period of drought and water scarcity can be expected for the years lying ahead.
2. Year-on-year, the number of days where the average temperature exceeds 30°C every day, is increasing every year, contributing to increased levels of water scarcity due to evaporation.
3. All cities and towns in the Western Cape were mapped in terms of risk related to water resources, where green indicated low, yellow medium and red high risk. In respect of the Langeberg Municipal Area, four of our five towns, Robertson, Ashton, Montagu and Bonnievale were indicated yellow medium risk in terms of water resources for the future. Only McGregor received a green low risk indicator.

In closing, the best news for Langeberg Municipality came during the last presentation at the PCF, where all water infrastructure priorities and project applications to National- and Provincial Water Affairs, as well as to Provincial Local Government, were presented and discussed. The Western Cape Provincial Government confirmed its approval and funding towards the raising of the Dassieshoek dam wall infrastructure project, as well as its support to the increase of the allocation of water from the Brandvlei canal.

It is my pleasure to communicate with each and every resident of, and visitor to the Langeberg Municipality.

OUTCOMES OF THE LANGEBERG COUNCIL MEETING REGARDING WATER RESTRICTIONS IN ROBERTSON

The Ordinary Meeting of Council held on 26 February 2025 addressed critical issues regarding water status and restrictions in Robertson. The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

1. **Dassieshoek Dam Wall:** The height of the Dassieshoek dam wall will be increased to boost water storage capacity by 30%.
2. **Brandvlei Canal Allocation:** A follow-up on the application for increased water allocation from the Brandvlei canal will be pursued, with interactions with relevant authorities to ensure successful completion.
3. **Pumping Capacity Plan:** A plan to enhance the capacity for pumping more water from the Brandvlei canal, including the possibility of an additional pipeline to the Gum Grove dam, will be submitted.
4. **De Hoop Water Scheme Maintenance:** The grids in the water separation boxes from the De Hoop water scheme will be cleaned frequently.
5. **Flow Monitoring:** The flow from the De Hoop water scheme will be measured and monitored, with a flow meter installed in the pipeline to the Gum Grove dam.
6. **Water Supply Management:** The Municipal Manager and the Director of Engineering Services will manage the water supply to Robertson daily, based on the availability of existing water resources.
7. **Lifting Water Restrictions:** Water restrictions will be lifted at the end of February 2025. However, water resource levels will be closely monitored, and level 1 water restrictions may be re-instituted if levels become critically low.
8. **Irrigation Water Restrictions:** The current restriction on irrigation water use will remain to protect existing water resources.

Farmer Water Allocations: Offers by farmers to take up their water allocations will be accepted immediately if water levels become critically low.

Independent Investigation: An Independent Professional Water Specialist will be appointed to investigate the status of water supply and sanitation in all five towns in the Langeberg Municipal Servicing area. The investigation will include:

- Available water resources
- Ageing infrastructure
- Population growth
- Consumption patterns, including holiday periods
- Organizational structure of Engineering Services
- Split between Water Services Authority and Water Services Provider functions
- Section 78 Assessment on Water and Sanitation Function

Public Communication: A press release will be issued to inform the public of the various challenges contributing to the water restrictions.

Appreciation for Conservation Efforts: As a token of appreciation for the water conservation efforts of Robertson residents, level 1 penalty tariffs will not be imposed for February 2025. Consumers will receive their normal municipal accounts for water consumption during this period.

The Council expresses its gratitude to the residents of Robertson for their continued efforts in conserving water and ensuring sustainable water management.

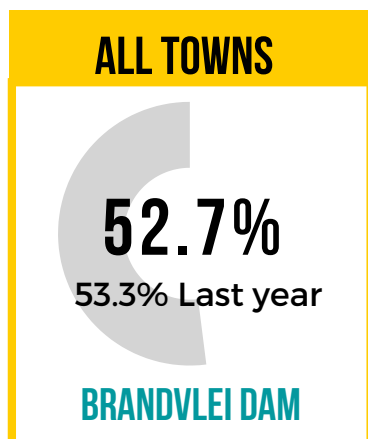
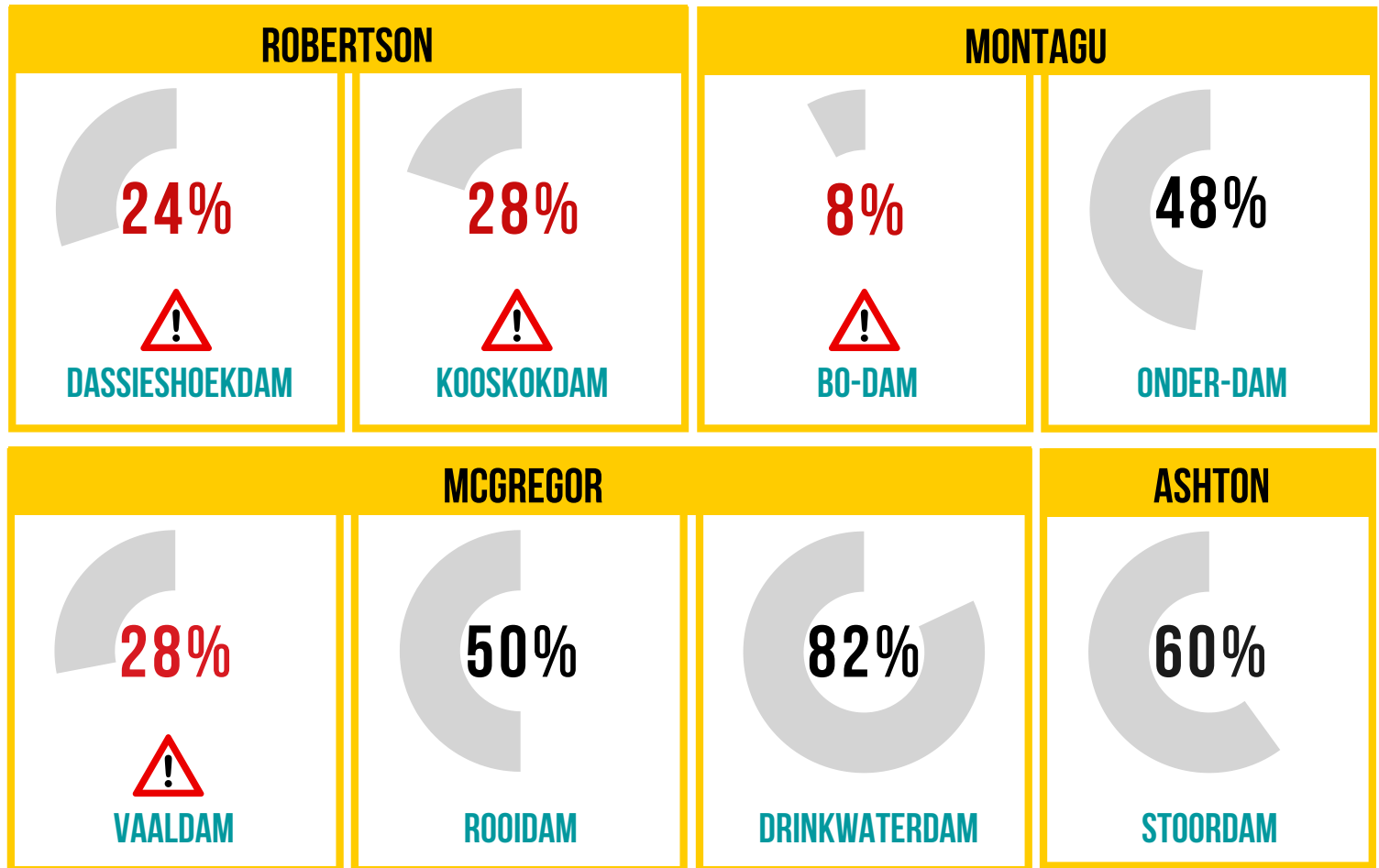

SASSA CARD SWITCH: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE 20 MARCH 2025

All SASSA beneficiaries need to switch their gold Postbank cards to the new black Postbank cards or alternatively, switch to a bank payment before 20 March 2025. After this date, gold cards will no longer be valid.

Consequences of Not Switching

- You will not be able to withdraw money.
- You will not be able to check your balance.
- You will not receive your monthly grant.

Card Switch Locations in Langeberg

Unfortunately, there are currently no locations within the Langeberg Municipal area where beneficiaries can complete the card switch. Postbank is still in the process of sourcing a site in Robertson, which will be communicated to all SASSA beneficiaries and stakeholders as soon as it is known. The nearest location where the new black card is issued is Shoprite in Durban Street, Worcester, operating Monday to Friday (08:00 - 17:00).

Alternative Payment Option: Receiving Grants via Bank Account

If you are unable to receive a black Postbank card before 20 March 2025, Postbank says people can register for the cardless option at its service points until they are able to get their Black Cards.

Beneficiaries can also choose to have their grants paid directly into their personal bank accounts. To arrange this, beneficiaries need to submit the following documents on or before 20 March 2025:

- Proof of own bank account (third-party accounts are not allowed)
- Copy of ID

- Completed Consent Form for Bank Change Payment ([click here](#))
- Completed Declaration and Consent Form ([click here](#))

Additional SASSA Service/Contact Points

If you are unable to receive a black Postbank card before 20 March 2025, you can register for the cardless option at its service points until they are able to get their Black Cards.

Social grant beneficiaries that may miss the deadline of 20 March 2025 to replace their cards with Postbank Black Cards will be paid with their ID's in Post Office branches and retailers via a cardless payment method process that require only ID and a cellphone. The beneficiary cellphone number requires to be registered.

- Mondays: Ashton – Barnard Hall (14 & 24 March 2025)

- Thursdays: Montagu – Wilhelm Thys Community Hall (13, 20, 27 March 2025)

Please Note: If a beneficiary has previously applied for a grant in another region, they will be required to review their application since the new region does not have access to their previous records. For more information, please contact your nearest SASSA office.

LANGERBERG MUNICIPALITY'S SPAZA SHOP POLICY

Spaza shops play a crucial role in the informal sector, contributing significantly to reducing unemployment and stimulating the local economy. Recognizing their importance, the Langeberg Municipality has established a comprehensive policy to support and regulate spaza shops within residential areas of Ashton, Bonnievale, McGregor, Montagu, and Robertson.

This article aims to inform the public about the key aspects of this policy, ensuring that both current and prospective spaza shop owners are aware of the requirements and procedures involved.

DEFINITION OF A SPAZA SHOP

A spaza shop is a small-scale convenience store operated from an authorized structure by the property owner or a family member/legal tenant residing on the property. The dominant use of the property must stay residential. These shops provide daily necessities such as bread, milk, pre-packaged foodstuffs, soft drinks, and cell phone supplies, operating from 07:00 to 21:00, Monday to Sunday.

APPLICATION PROCESS

To operate a spaza shop from a residential property, you must submit an application for Consent for a "house shop" to the Town Planning Department.

The process involves:

- **Obtain the Application Form:** Visit the Town Planning Department to get the application form. Ensure you have all the necessary supporting documents.
- **Complete the Application:** Fill out the application form thoroughly. Include:
 - A site plan and motivation
 - Proof of ownership or authorization by the owner
 - Copies of ID documents
 - The prescribed application fee (non-refundable if the application is refused)
- **Submit the Application:** Submit the completed application form and supporting documents to the Town Planning Department.
- **Advertising and Notification:** The application will be advertised, and written notices will be sent to surrounding property owners for comments. A notice must also be displayed on the premises during the advertising period.
- **Consultation and Inspection:** The Town Planning Department will consult with various roleplayers including the Cape Winelands Health Department, Building Inspectorate, Ward Committee, and SAPS. A site inspection may be arranged.
- **Evaluation:** The application will be evaluated based on merit, in accordance with the requirements outlined in Sections 4 and 5 of the Council Policy, considering factors such as the size and impact of the shop, residential character, and compliance with health requirements.
- **Decision:** The Municipality will approve or refuse the application and provide reasons for the decision.



LANGEBERG MUNICIPALITY'S SPAZA SHOP POLICY (CONTINUED)

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

Spaza shops must meet specific health standards, including adequate ventilation and illumination, and must not open directly onto bedrooms or toilets. A Certificate of Acceptability from the Cape Winelands District Municipality: Health is required.

ADVERTISING ON THE PREMISES

Approved spaza shops may erect a sign with the shop's name, in accordance with the Council's Advertising Policy.

REASONS FOR REFUSAL

Applications may be refused for various reasons, including non-compliance with the Policy, health requirements, unsuitable site conditions, or potential negative impacts on the community and environment.

WITHDRAWAL OF APPROVAL

Approval may be withdrawn for violations such as non-compliance with conditions, sale of illegal goods, or written complaints from the community.

MONITORING, COMPLIANCE, AND ENFORCEMENT

The municipality emphasizes the importance of compliance with zoning schemes, building and fire regulations, and health regulations. Operating without the necessary approvals is unacceptable and impacts negatively on the economy, health and safety, and residential quality of life. Residents must ensure that they purchase only from spaza shops which have been approved and which display their health certificate and their business licence.

The Langeberg Municipality's Spaza Shop Policy aims to support the informal sector while ensuring compliance with necessary health and safety regulations. By following the outlined procedures and requirements, spaza shop owners can contribute positively to the local economy and community.

UPGRADING OF INFORMAL SETTLEMENT: BOEKENHOUTSKLOOF, BONNIEVALE

As part of the upgrading of informal settlements program, 574 plots at Boekenhoutskloof in Bonnievale are being upgraded with A-grade services to the value of R66 542 157. The project commenced in August 2023, with ASLA as the contractor.

A-grade services include surfaced roads, water, sewer, stormwater and electrical networks.

Keys are handed over to qualifying beneficiaries so they can take ownership of their ablution structure, which includes a waterborne toilet, wash basin, tap and water meter.

Since February 2025, more than 240 serviced sites in the Boekenhoutskloof settlement have been handed over to qualifying beneficiaries.

Please bring copies of the following documents that you have in your possession.

1. ID document of applicant and spouse / partner (as well as the ID's of all your children / financial dependents)
2. Marriage certificate
3. Birth certificates
4. Death certificate
5. Divorce certificate
6. Pay slip / Unemployment Affidavit of applicant and spouse / partner
7. SASSA Letter Confirming that you receive an old age or disability grant
8. Military veterans must indicate that they are veterans to be captured on the system.

POTENTIAL APPLICANTS

Anyone who complies with the criteria listed below can register on the database. (Only one application per household.)

TO QUALIFY FOR A HOUSING SUBSIDY, YOU MUST

- Be a South African citizen
- Be 18 years and older
- Be married or habitually cohabit with a long-term partner

HUMAN RIGHTS DAY: MORE THAN JUST A PUBLIC HOLIDAY



On Human Rights Day, South Africans are asked to reflect on their rights, to protect their rights and the rights of all people from violation, irrespective of race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, whether they are foreign nationals or not – human rights apply to everyone, equally.

The History of Human Rights Day

Human Rights Day in South Africa is historically linked with 21 March 1960, and the events of Sharpeville. On that day 69 people died and 180 were wounded when police fired on a peaceful crowd that had gathered in protest against the Pass laws. This day marked an affirmation by ordinary people, rising in unison to proclaim their rights. It became an iconic date in our country's history that today we commemorate as Human Rights Day as a reminder of our rights and the cost paid for our treasured human rights.

When South Africa held its first democratic election, with Nelson Mandela elected as its first democratic President, 21 March, Human Rights Day was officially proclaimed a public holiday.

What are your rights?

Our Constitution is hailed as one of the most progressive in the world. The Constitution is the ultimate protector of our Human Rights, which were previously denied to the majority of our people under Apartheid. We commemorate Human Rights Day to reinforce our commitment to the Bill of Rights as enshrined in our Constitution.

These rights include:

- In terms of the Bill of Rights everyone has a right to life, equality and human dignity.

- All persons have a right to citizenship and security. Persons and groups are entitled to freedom of assembly, association, belief, opinion, and expression. They have the right to demonstrate, picket and petition; everyone has the right to be free from forced labour, servitude and slavery.
- All persons have a right to privacy and to exercise political rights; all have a right to access information and just administration action. They have rights when arrested, detained and accused, and must have access to courts.
- All have a right to freedom of movement and residence and trade, occupation and profession. In the workplace, everyone has a right to engage in trade unions and labour movements. Anyone has the right to purchase property anywhere and to a basic education. They have a right to language, culture, and communities; and not least, freedom of religion and belief. The Bill of Rights also specifies the rights of persons belonging to cultural, religious or linguistic communities and the rights of children. In addition, there are specific laws to safeguard women and protect children.
- Protected rights include a healthy environment, housing, health care, food, water and social security.

Whether we are at the workplace, within communities, at schools, or with our partners and children, we all need to demonstrate the kind of responsibility that we would like to see in our country's future. We must remain vigilant and report abuse and cruelty, such as human trafficking, child labour, forced labour and violence against women, children, and the aged and other vulnerable groupings of people.

SCHOOLS IN LANGEBERG EXPLORE LOCAL HISTORY AND TOURISM

Langeberg Municipality, in collaboration with the Montagu Museum, the Department of Local Government, and Breede River Hospice, hosted the Local History and Tourism Awareness Program from 6 to 25 February 2025 across the Langeberg region. This initiative was designed to align with the school curriculum and integrated into the Social Science subject for Grade 4 and multigrade (Grade 4-6) classes of nine schools across Montagu, Ashton, and Bonnievale.

Learners explored a variety of topics designed to deepen their understanding of their hometowns and tourism's role in their communities. As part of the initiative, donations were made to schools by Langeberg Municipality, Dragon Fly Foods and RAM.

LANGEBERG MUNICIPALITY TO BE PART OF THE REVIEW OF THE WESTERN CAPE SPATIAL DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK PLAN

Development and the allocation of funding must be plan-led. This ensures efficiency, investor-confidence, prioritisation and fairness of allocation of resources. Municipalities are required to have spatial plans which guide the development of their area as a whole and the development of each town.

One of the most important plans is the Langeberg Spatial Development Framework (LSDF). The LSDF was adopted in 2015, reviewed during 2023/24 and approved by Council on 4 December 2024. The 2024 SDF will be adopted by Council as part of the IDP during 2025.

So what is an SDF, and why is it important?

An SDF is a long-term plan to guide development in a way which is sustainable. The development of infrastructure, housing and community facilities are guided in such a way so as to ensure that Municipal services are provided in the most cost-effective manner, and that natural resources, particularly water, are protected.

To achieve this, the SDF demarcates Spatial Planning Categories, in accordance with bio-regional planning principles, which guide land use decisions to ensure the conservation of the natural spatial form of the area, including the Langeberg and Riviersonderend Mountain Catchment Areas and the Breede River and its tributaries.

At the local (town) level, the demarcation of urban edges is the most important feature. The defined urban edges in the LSDF have proven to be reliable and well-informed by levels of development and have ensured that the development of each of the five towns has remained as compact as possible, thus facilitating sustainability in terms of the Municipality's primary mandate of efficient service delivery.

What is the Provincial SDF and why is it important at municipal level?

All Municipal SDFs must be aligned with planning at National and Provincial Level. The WCPSDF sets the context for the LSDF. The Western Cape Government will soon commence with the development of a new Provincial Spatial Development Framework for the Western Cape.

On 12 December 2024, the Provincial Minister of Local Government, Environmental Affairs and Development Planning appointed a number of members to sit on the WC Intergovernmental Steering Committee (ISC) to oversee the development of this plan. Langeberg Municipality will be well represented with both of their registered Town and Regional Planners, Mr Jack van Zyl and Ms Tracy Brunings, having been appointed as members of this Committee for 2025/26.

Involvement in this process is important to ensure that development needs and priorities of the Langeberg Municipal area are represented and that projects in the LSDF which require intergovernmental cooperation for implementation, are supported. Similarly, many issues faced by Langeberg are also faced by other Municipalities and joint plans are required. Priority projects, include the following, inter alia:

- Rural Development Guidelines to ensure consistency across municipal boundaries.
- New Schools must be built on identified sites to promote education, skills levels, and social stability. School sites are large land uses and difficult to locate with good accessibility if lost to other uses.
- The preparation of river maintenance management plans – rivers cut across different areas of jurisdiction and require joint management in terms of conservation and flood mitigation.

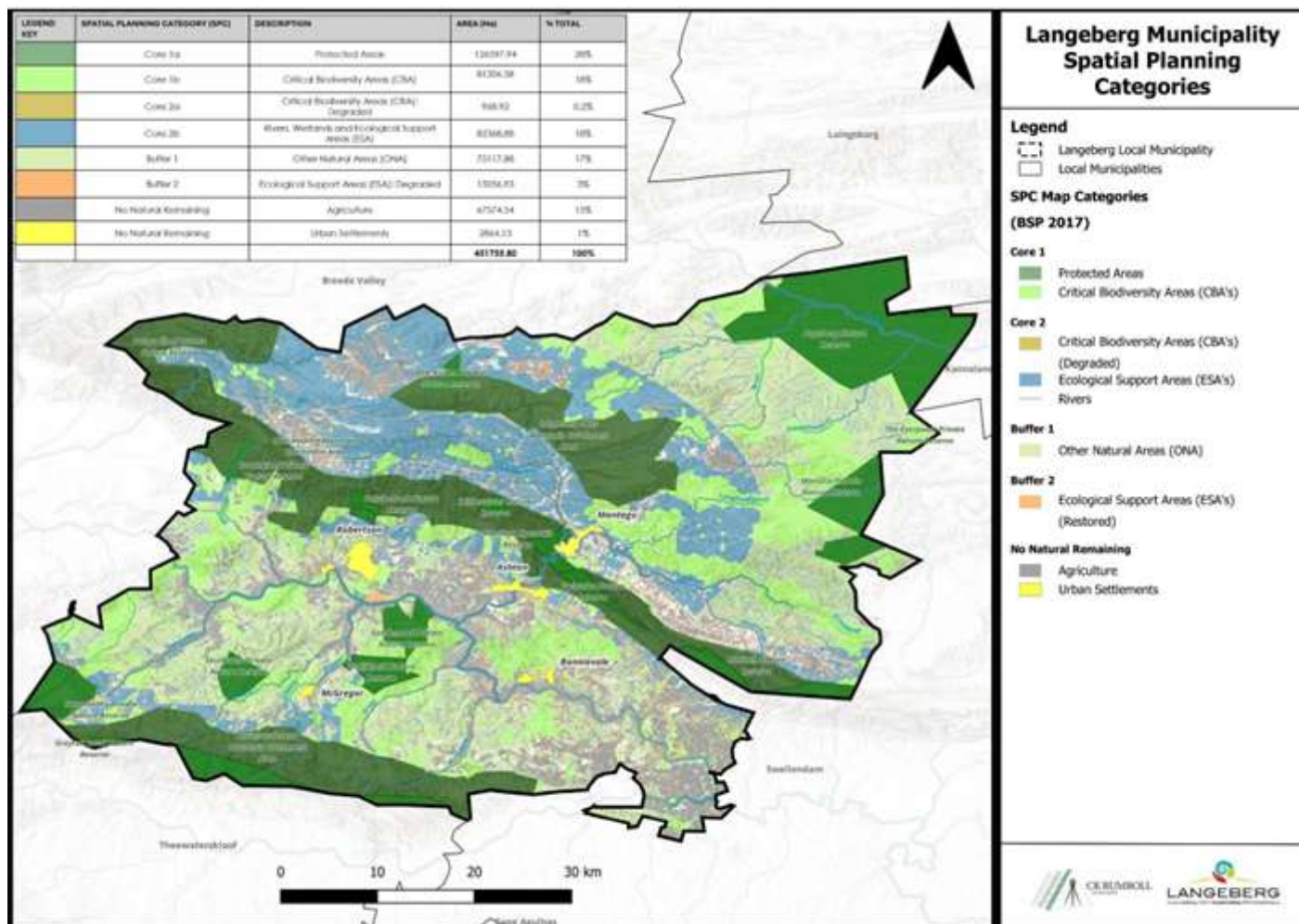
- Scenic tourism routes and heritage inventories require funding and intergovernmental cooperation.
- Promotion of business and industrial development to accommodate economic demand.
- Alternative energy generation strategies and projects (private and public-private partnerships).
- Promotion of urban agricultural projects to balance the lack of jobs, and growing migration to our towns.
- Migration control is a national responsibility, but municipalities face the practical consequences as all illegal migrants occupy space in one or another municipality. A programme to address illegal migration and related land invasion, is urgent so as not to compromise Municipalities' ability to deliver on their mandate of basic service delivery.

- Additional landfill space / alternative waste disposal options are required for all towns.
- Housing is a provincial competency and requires fast-tracking at Provincial and National levels. Negotiations regarding purchasing land for new housing projects are crucial.

We are excited for the challenges and opportunities that can be unlocked together through the drafting of the new WCSDF, and the support it can provide for the implementation of local plans.

The Municipal Manager, Mr Danie Lubbe welcomed the opportunity for Langeberg Professional Planners to be part of this important initiative and wishes them well with this endeavour over and above their responsibilities within Langeberg Municipality.

BOUNDARY WALLS — THE GOOD, THE BAD AND THE UGLY

Boundary walls and fences in residential areas are mostly built on private property. But they are also an important contribution to what our towns look and feel like from the public streets.

BE AWARE OF CURRENT REQUIREMENTS FOR BOUNDARY WALLS AND FENCES

- No one may erect, alter, or demolish any boundary wall or fence without **prior Municipal approval**. In some cases, approval from Heritage Western Cape is also required. Specific requirements also apply within defined urban conservation areas.
- Residents must comply with the Langeberg Municipality's long-established **Boundary Wall Policy (A1088 of 2004)**. The purpose of the policy is to foster an environment which promotes safety while respecting aesthetics, and historical preservation.
- In terms of the **Boundary Wall Policy**, the three main controls for boundary walls in the residential areas are: **height, construction materials and aesthetics**, particularly in terms of the transparency versus solidity of walls/fences.

Section 16 of the Langeberg Bylaw on Streets, 2023 also prohibits the erection of **dangerous fences** (example: electrified/barbed/razor-wire) on street boundaries without prior approval.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS IN THE BOUNDARY WALL POLICY INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING:

- Walls along street boundaries may be a maximum of 1,2m in height but may be 1,8m where specific requirements are met e.g., exclusively transparent fencing; or a foundation wall of a maximum of 0,9m high with pillars and transparent steel fencing.
- Walls on side and rear boundaries are capped at 2.1m but may be authorized at 2.4m with consent from neighbours.
- The policy prohibits materials like waste materials, zinc, or asbestos sheeting, unfinished or exposed concrete, artificial stone or slate, and wooden fencing.
- No wall may obstruct the flow of traffic or sight distances.
- Walls longer than 30m must incorporate design variations to avoid monotony.
- No tree in the way of a boundary wall or fence may be damaged or removed without Council approval.

BOUNDARY WALLS — THE GOOD, THE BAD AND THE UGLY (CONTINUED)

APPROVAL PROCESS:

- Property owners must submit building plans to the municipality before erecting or altering a boundary wall. The application must include material specifications, foundation details, position of services, proposed colours and finishes and construction methods.
- Boundary walls lower than 1,8m high may qualify as minor building works which do not require a full building plan submission but do require an application to be submitted for approval in terms of the policy.
- This ensures that even minor works maintain safety, uniformity, and respect for the surrounding area's architectural and historical character.

COMPLIANCE & ENFORCEMENT PROCESS:

Property owners who erect walls without the required approval not only impact aesthetics and safety but cause unnecessary costs and time delays, at the expense of ratepayers, relating to legal enforcement procedures.

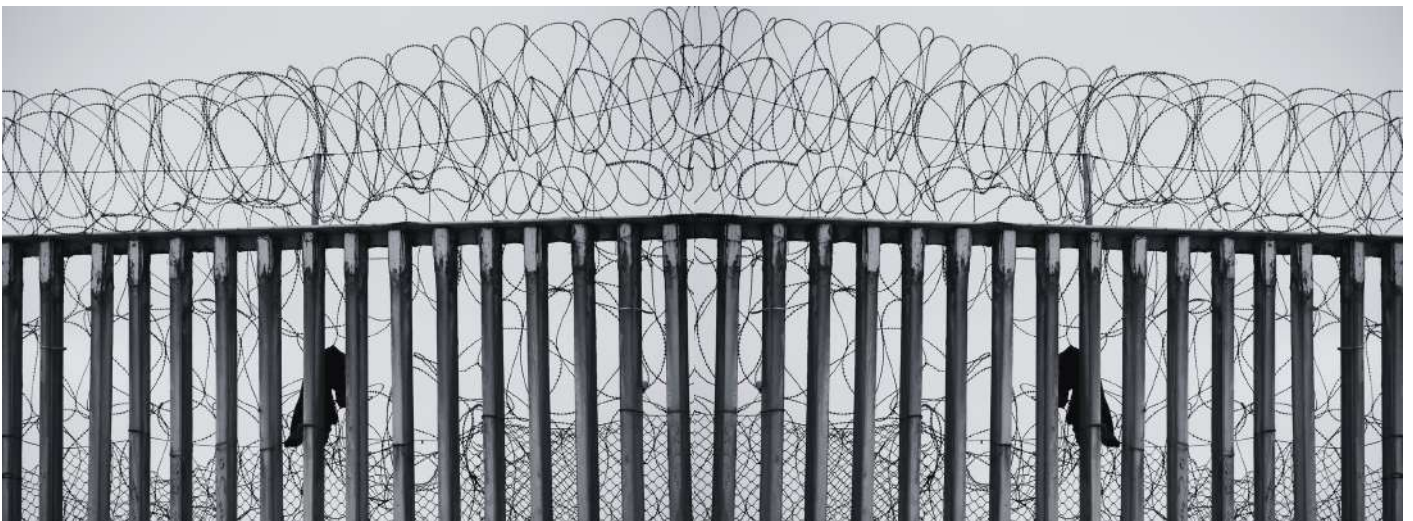

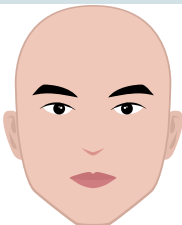
