To celebrate this natural beauty and promote environmental sustainability, the Municipality is proud to participate in Arbor Month through a tree-planting initiative in partnership with the Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment (DFFE). This forms part of the broader Presidential Ten Million Trees Flagship Project, which seeks to engage all South Africans in a nationwide tree-planting effort to combat climate change, enhance the ecosystems, and improve livelihoods. Unfortunately, much of the Langeberg region received below-average rainfall this winter, and this will likely impact our water supply in the months ahead. If conditions do not improve, we may be forced to introduce water restrictions. Already, all municipalities in the Western Cape were recently warned at the Premier's Co-ordinating Forum meeting of the imminent drought that is staring the Western Cape Province in the face.

We have already noted increased water consumption across the region. With warmer weather approaching, demand is expected to rise even further. I therefore appeal to every household to follow the water-saving tips included in this newsletter. With collective effort, we can prevent unnecessary restrictions and ensure a sustainable water supply for all. Water is a valuable and scarce resource, which we should cherish.

September is also observed as Tourism Month, Heritage Month, and Public Service Month—with great reason to celebrate!

A special congratulations goes to Montagu, which was recently named Best Dorpie at the KFM 94.5 Best of the Cape Awards. We are proud of this well-deserved recognition and invite all residents and visitors to explore the beauty of our towns. The Municipality is pleased to announce the formal approval of its Municipal Process Plan. This strategic framework will guide the development and implementation of the Integrated Development Plan (IDP) and Budget for the upcoming financial year.

CLIMATE CHANGE

IMPACTS OUR WATER RESOURCES



Climate change significantly impacts water resources worldwide, affecting availability, quality, and the frequency of water-related hazards like floods and droughts.

Although we do not have direct control over the effects of climate change, we do have control over our water usage and how water is used during drought periods.

Each individual has the responsibility to adapt to manage and minimise the impact of climate change.

HOW CLIMATE CHANGE IMPACTS WATER RESOURCES:

The warmer temperatures increase the rate of water evaporation, which affects the amount of rainfall causing drought in some areas and excess precipitation in others.

Water runoff and flooding increase, reducing the quality of water causing health risks and damage to water system infrastructure. It also disrupts food supply.

WHAT CAN I DO?

Reduce water consumption



Take short showers and turn off taps while washing, brushing and shaving.



Fix leaking taps, pipes and toilets.



Install water-saving toilet flush systems.



Choose WaterSense-labeled fixtures and appliances like showerheads and dishwashers.

Reuse water from baths, showers and laundry to flush the toilet, wash the car, clean the floor and water the garden.



Install rain tanks.



Conserve energy, opt for energy-efficient appliances and switch to LED lighting.



Embrace renewable energy like solar power for your home.



Reduce water pollution, by properly disposing of waste, avoid excessive fertilizers, and clean up pet waste to prevent runoff into waterways.



Minimise waste and recycle materials to reduce your carbon footprint.



Plant trees to absorb carbon dioxide. Create water-wise gardens with drought-resistant plants and indigenous vegetation. Use a drip irrigation systems.



Limit travel, walk, bike, use public transport or carpool, to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

LET'S PROTECT OUR WATER TOGETHER

Dear Residents of Ashton, Bonnievale, McGregor, Montagu, and Robertson,

We understand how much you care about your families, your homes, and the communities we all hold dear. That's why we are reaching out — not with alarm, but with trust. Trust that together, we can take small, meaningful steps to safeguard something we all rely on: our water. This past year, our region experienced less winter rainfall than usual. The lower rainfall will have a significant impact on water supply to all towns, especially if no rain will fall within the next few months.

Across the region, we've noticed higher water consumption. As warmer months approach, the water demand will increase further.

The percentage increase of water consumption per town between 2023/24 and 2024/25 financial years is as follows:

- Ashton: +22%
- Bonnievale: +13%
- McGregor: +16%
- Montagu: -4%
- Robertson: +12%

While Montagu saw a slight increase in rainfall and a drop in water consumption, most of its raw water still has to be pumped from Ashton, where usage has surged significantly by 22% in the past year.

The following dams are already under pressure as recorded on 28 August 2025:

- Dassiehoek Dam (Robertson): 54%
- Bo-Dam (Montagu): 18%
- Onder Dam (Montagu): 77%

We also needed to carry out essential canal maintenance and pipeline upgrades in Robertson, which temporarily affected supply.

Although restrictions are not currently being enforced, we kindly ask for your cooperation. If each household reduces its water use by just 10%, we can avoid imposing restrictions and keep our systems stable.

These small adjustments can make a big difference to pro-actively conserve water:

- Keep showers under 3 minutes.
- Turn off taps while brushing teeth or shaving.
- Repair leaks promptly.
- Install water-saving flush systems or displacement bottles.
- Reuse greywater (from baths, laundry) for:
 - Flushing toilets
 - Cleaning cars
 - Mopping floors
 - Watering gardens
- Install rainwater tanks for outdoor purposes.
- Choose WaterWise appliances.

We cannot predict what the next rainy season will bring, but we do know this: when Langeberg residents unite, we can meet the challenge.

NEW MULTI-PURPOSE SPORTS COURT AT ZOLANI SPORTS GROUNDS

The new multi-purpose sports court at Zolani Sports Grounds was officially handed over to the Langeberg Municipality on Tuesday, 26 August 2025, marking an important milestone in expanding sporting opportunities for the community. The court currently accommodates netball and futsal, with the potential to add other sports codes in the future, making it a flexible space for the community. The project, which commenced on 19 May 2025, reflects the Municipality's commitment to improving community sports infrastructure in the municipal area.

In addition, rugby and soccer combination goalposts were installed the previous week as part of equipment purchased during the previous financial year, offering a versatile solution for training and matches in limited space. This upgrade benefits schools and the wider community, complementing the multi-purpose court and encouraging a variety of sporting activities.

The design and construction of the new multi-purpose court, valued at R1 010 000.00, was undertaken by the contractor Perfect Bounce.

Councillor Andisiwe Ndongeni (Ward Councillor, Ward 10) said, "This multi-purpose court is a significant step for our youth and the wider community. Facilities like this also help address social challenges in our community by providing a safe environment for recreation and skill development."

This court will provide a quality space for training, competing, and enjoying sport, and offer a facility with the capacity for the youth to train and compete."

With these upgrades, Zolani Sports Grounds now provides a safe and flexible space for multiple sport codes, encouraging teamwork, healthy lifestyles, and community development.

On 19 August 2025, Langeberg Municipality reaffirmed its commitment to excellence in governance with the official presentation of the clean audit trophy. The award recognises the municipality's sixth consecutive clean audit—and thirteenth overall—for the 2023–2024 financial year, as confirmed by the Auditor-General of South Africa (AGSA) in May 2025.

A clean audit, formally known as an unqualified audit opinion with no findings, is the highest recognition an auditee can receive from the AGSA. The audit process examines the municipality's financial management, procurement and tender procedures, performance evaluation systems, and legal compliance. Such a result indicates that the financial statements are accurate, free from material misstatements, and that the municipality has fully complied with legislation and reported appropriately on its performance objectives. Essentially, it confirms that public funds were used effectively and for their intended purpose.

Executive Mayor Alderman Schalk van Eeden praised the achievement, calling it a collective victory:

"Six consecutive clean audits do not happen by chance. It takes hard work, discipline, and a clear commitment to public service and the responsible management of public funds. My sincere gratitude goes to our finance department, management team, administrative staff, and Councillors for their

dedication to clean administration, good governance, and sound financial management. This reflects the values we uphold as a municipality and demonstrates to our community that their trust in us is well placed."

In addition to his praise for the broader team, the Mayor extended heartfelt thanks to the Municipal Manager, the Directors, and all municipal staff who played a vital role in securing this achievement.

"Your unwavering commitment, professionalism, and teamwork have once again ensured that Langeberg maintains its clean audit status. This recognition is a testament to your hard work and integrity, and I am proud to lead a team that consistently upholds the highest standards of public service," he added.

The Langeberg Municipality also acknowledges the invaluable contribution of the late Chief Financial Officer, Mr Mava Shude, who passed away in December 2024. Representatives from the Auditor-General's Office are currently auditing the financial year 2024–2025. As the next audit is underway, Langeberg remains dedicated to maintaining high standards and continuing to serve its community with integrity.



EXECUTIVE MAYOR TABLES ROLLOVER ADJUSTMENT BUDGET FOR THE 2025/26 FINANCIAL YEAR

The Executive Mayor has officially tabled the Rollover Adjustment Budget for the 2025/26 financial year, following Section 28(2)(e) of the Municipal Finance Management Act (MFMA). This adjustment incorporates critical projects that were not completed in the previous financial year and are now being rolled over for implementation.

The Mayor emphasised the importance of compliance with the Municipal Budgeting and Reporting Regulations, noting that the adjustments must be approved by Council by 25 August 2025. These adjustments ensure that unspent funds from the 2024/25 financial year are reallocated to priority projects that support infrastructure development and service delivery.

Key Highlights of the Adjustment Budget:

- Total Capital Expenditure Adjustment:
Increased from R136,175,651.87 to R174,331,472.71, reflecting a boost of R38,155,820.84.
- Major Projects Include:
 - Replacement of siphon pipeline from Robertson Canal to Gumgrove Dam (R5 million)
 - Water pipe replacement in Bonnievale (R7.6 million)
 - Ashton road upgrades (R11.1 million)
 - Construction of a new netball court at Zolani sports field (R535,031)
 - ICT infrastructure upgrades and digital radio network expansion

- Revenue Adjustments:
 - Operating revenue increased to R1,182,091,000
 - Total revenue, including capital transfers adjusted to R1,242,379,000
- Expenditure Adjustments:
 - Total expenditure revised to R1,241,541,000
 - Overall budget expenditure now totals R1,415,872,472.71

The Mayor confirmed that all rolled-over items will be integrated into the revised Service Delivery and Budget Implementation Plan (SDBIP) for 2025/26, which will be submitted to Council in September 2025. These projects will serve as key performance indicators to ensure transparency and accountability.

“I want to thank all councillors and the administrative team for their dedication. This budget is more than numbers—it’s a commitment to progress, inclusion, and resilience. Together, we will build a municipality that responds to the needs of all its people.”

Repair Work Successfully Completed

We are pleased to announce that the repair work at the intersection of Voortrekker Road and Reitz Street in Robertson was successfully completed on Friday, 15 August 2025.

This follows the sinkhole that occurred on 17 July 2025, caused by the collapse of an underground sewer pipeline. Although Voortrekker Road is classified as a Provincial Road, Langeberg Municipality took prompt action to carry out and complete the necessary repairs within 20 days.

What Caused the Collapse?

An investigation conducted by WEC-Consult, in collaboration with Langeberg Municipality, confirmed that the sinkhole resulted from the gradual structural failure of an ageing concrete sewer pipe beneath the road surface.

Key findings include:

- Aggressive sewer gases corroded the inner concrete lining of the reinforced pipe, exposing and eventually disintegrating the embedded steel reinforcement.
- This corrosion weakened the pipe's structure, which ultimately collapsed under the weight of surrounding materials and traffic vibrations.
- The collapse allowed nearby sand to be drawn into the sewer system, creating a growing underground void.
- Over time, the void expanded until the road surface could no longer support traffic, resulting in the sudden formation of the sinkhole.

Key actions taken:

- Replacement of the damaged pipe with a 6-meter Class 12 PVC pipe

Installation of a new prefabricated concrete manhole

- Full road reconstruction to meet Provincial Road standards for long-term durability

Traffic flow has resumed, and the area is once again safe for all motorists and pedestrians.

Planning Ahead: Upgrading Remaining Infrastructure

The remaining portion of Voortrekker Road is still operating with an ageing sewer pipeline, which poses a definite risk of future failures.

Current mitigation measures include:

- Frequent cleaning to minimise risk and optimise operation
- CCTV and gas detection monitoring for early signs of corrosion

We are actively exploring options to reline this section with corrosion-resistant materials such as PVC or HDPE. The existing pipeline will be inspected to determine the most appropriate re-lining method, with careful consideration to minimise disruptions to businesses and traffic in this busy area.

The timing of this improvement project is critical, as construction-related disruptions are expected. Execution of the re-lining also depends on budget availability and/or financial support from the Western Cape Province, given that this is a provincial road.

We thank the community for your understanding and cooperation throughout this repair process. Your safety and the continued stability of our infrastructure remain our highest priorities.

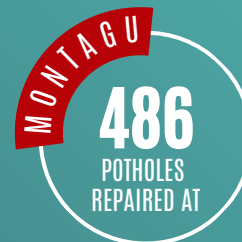

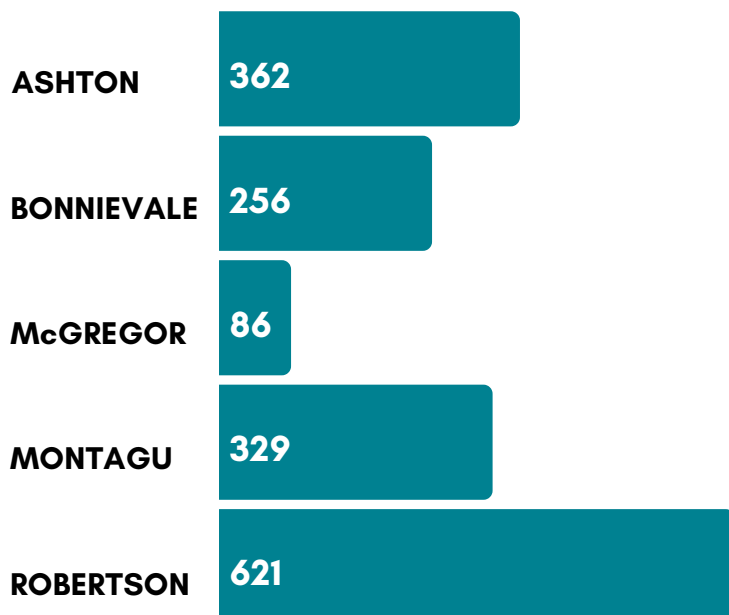

PRIVATE LANDOWNERS' LEGAL DUTY TO CONTROL INVASIVE PLANTS

In terms of the National Environmental Management: Biodiversity Act (NEM:BA), all landowners, including private property owners, are legally obligated to control and, where necessary, eradicate listed invasive plant species found on their land.

Invasive alien plants are non-native species that spread aggressively, outcompeting indigenous vegetation and disrupting ecosystems. They can reduce biodiversity, deplete water resources, increase fire risk, and impact agricultural productivity. Effective control and removal are therefore essential to protect our natural environment and the services it provides.

Your Responsibility as a Landowner

- Identify invasive species on your property.
- Control or remove them in line with legal requirements and best environmental practices.
- Prevent re-establishment through regular monitoring and maintenance.
- Failure to comply with these obligations may result in enforcement action and penalties under NEM:BA.

AFRICAN SWINE FEVER

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

1. What is African Swine Fever?

- African swine fever (ASF) is a **SERIOUS VIRAL DISEASE** that affects wild and domestic pigs.
- There is no vaccine.
- There is no treatment for affected pigs.
- Warthogs and bush pigs carry the virus but do not show signs of the disease.

2. How do the pigs get sick?

- Contact with sick domestic pigs.
- Ingestion of contaminated material (such as food, waste, feed and garbage).
- Contact with contaminated people, shoes, clothing, vehicles and equipment.
- Soft ticks.

3. Does ASF affect people?

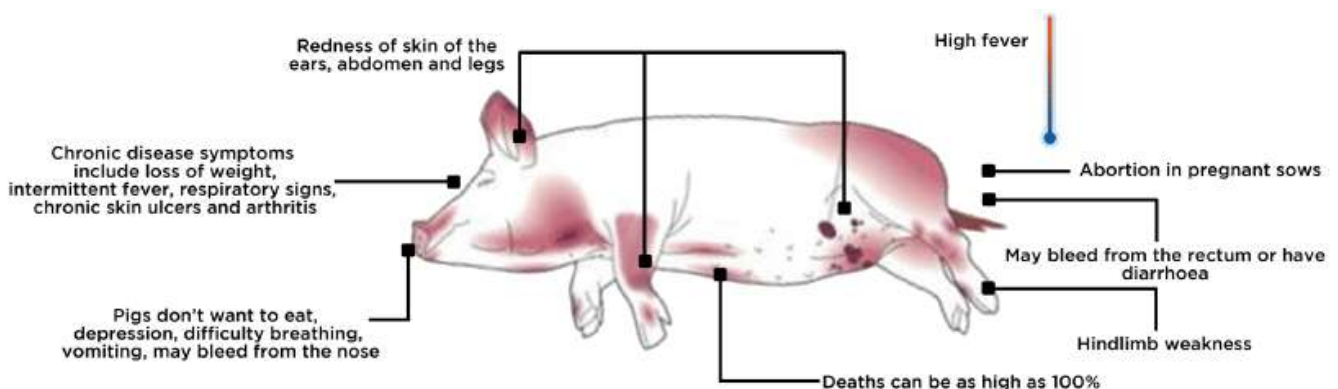
ASF is not transmitted to humans. However, it is not recommended to eat the meat of any sick animal or animal that has died.

4. What are the Symptoms?

- Redness of the skin of the ears, abdomen and legs.
- High fever.
- Abortion in pregnant sows.
- May bleed from the rectum or have diarrhoea.
- Hindlimb weakness.
- Deaths can be as high as 100%.
- Pigs don't want to eat, depression, difficulty breathing, vomiting, may bleed from the nose.
- Chronic disease symptoms include loss of weight, intermittent fever, respiratory signs, chronic skin ulcers and arthritis.

5. Preventative measures?

- If ASF is suspected, inform your nearest animal health official immediately.
- Prevent access to your pigs from other pigs of unknown health status, unknown people, warthogs and wild pigs.
- If you purchase from an auction, insist on a health declaration by the seller to confirm that they come from a healthy herd.
- Only buy pigs from reputable owners, insist on a health certificate from their vet on the health status of the farm and its animals.
- Preferably do not feed kitchen waste, but if you have no option, remove all meats and cook the kitchen waste thoroughly.
