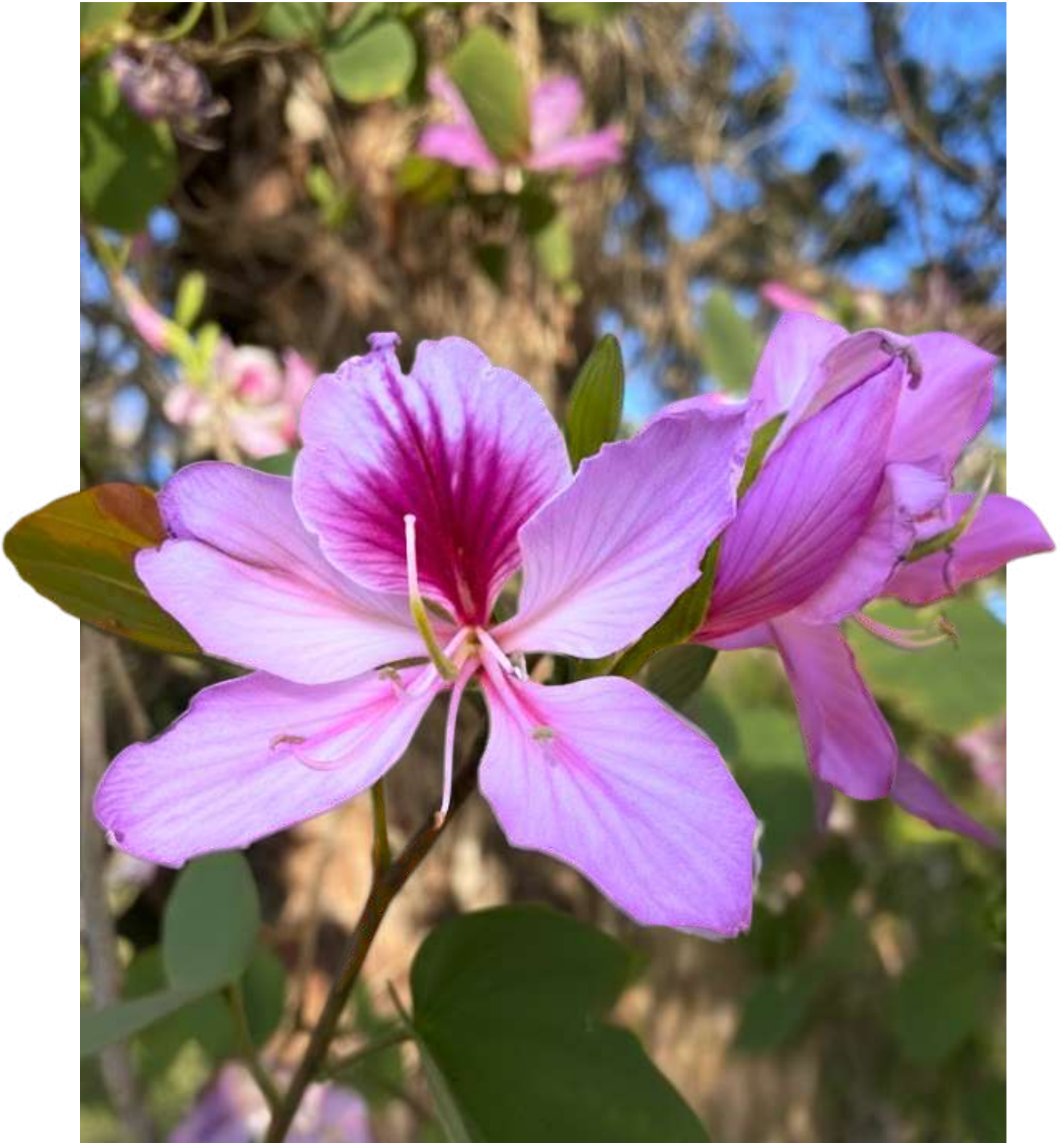

Water Security and Possible Level 1 Restrictions

As summer approaches, Langeberg Municipality faces the challenge of ensuring a sustainable water supply for all our residents. Despite repeated calls to save water, overall consumption has unfortunately been rising instead of decreasing.

With below-average rainfall this season, our dams and water resources are under increasing pressure. If this trend continues, the municipality may have no choice but to implement Level 1 water restrictions. These restrictions can be avoided if we all take responsibility and use water wisely.

We urge every household to:

- Fix leaking taps, pipes and toilets.
- Install water-saving flush systems and save a flush when possible.
- Capture rainwater from gutters.
- Take short showers and turn off taps while washing, brushing or shaving.
- Reuse water from baths, showers and laundry to flush toilets, wash cars, clean floors or water gardens.
- Choose WaterSense-labeled fixtures and appliances, such as showerheads and dishwashers.

Saving water today will help prevent tougher restrictions tomorrow. Let us all work together to ensure water security in the months ahead.

Municipal Accounts Reminder

Municipal accounts are issued by the 7th of each month. Payments are due on the 15th, unless this falls on a weekend or public holiday, in which case the next working day applies.

If accounts remain unpaid, the municipality may restrict or disconnect electricity services. To avoid this, residents are encouraged to arrange payment plans if necessary.

Important: Not receiving an account does not exempt you from payment. If you did not receive your statement, please make an estimated payment based on your previous usage.

Copies of statements can be resent via email or collected at the cashier desk of your nearest Langeberg Municipal office.

Due to the ongoing challenges being experienced with the Post Office and postal services in Langeberg, and also elsewhere throughout the Western Cape, residents are encouraged to change their postal addresses to email addresses in order to receive their municipal accounts on time and regularly.

If you suspect your bill is incorrect (for example, usage does not align with previous months), you may lodge a complaint:

- Contact the Debtors Office.
- Provide your previous readings or proof of usage.
- The Municipality will investigate and correct any errors if necessary.

Infrastructure Investment and Development

Wonderful news came in as we were finalising this newsletter! We are delighted to share that the Municipality has received grant funding from the National Treasury for the 'Upgrading of the Robertson Roads' project, which includes the Nkqubela precinct, as part of the Neighbourhood Development Grant.

The project has been approved in accordance with three project clusters, to a total value of R43 625 839.00 (including VAT).

It will cover specific roads, sidewalks, pedestrian walkways, pedestrian lighting, and informal trading upgrades. Further details will be in upcoming newsletters.

MOUNTAIN VIEW HOUSING BENEFICIARIES RECEIVE TITLE DEEDS IN BONNIEVALE

On Tuesday, 7 October 2025, Western Cape Minister of Infrastructure Tertius Simmers, accompanied by Executive Mayor Alderman Schalk van Eeden, officially handed over the first batch of title deeds to beneficiaries from the Mountain View Housing Project in Bonnievale.

The project consists of 623 housing units, all of which have been registered. Approximately 100 title deeds were handed over during the event, marking a significant milestone in providing residents with the security of full property ownership.

Minister Simmers highlighted the importance of title deeds in empowering communities, as they not only confirm ownership but also create opportunities for future financial growth.

Mayor van Eeden stated that all 623 registered owners can now enjoy the full benefits of owning their homes.

During the event, officials also explained how residents can safely keep their title deeds and the steps to follow should a replacement be required. Beneficiaries were urged to store the document securely, as it serves as valuable proof of ownership with significant legal and financial importance. Furthermore, officials encouraged all remaining beneficiaries to visit the municipal offices to collect their title deeds.

The handover represents the government's continued commitment to restoring dignity and providing tenure security to long-standing beneficiaries across the municipality.

Stress can be good in small doses. But lots of stress is bad for you. Learn to manage your stress with some fun stress-reducing activities.

- **Rock out!** Jump around to your favourite music until you're too tired to go on.
- **Splash around!** Find a pool, a lake, a dam, a puddle and splash around.
- **Get dirty!** Get into the garden and mow the lawn, plant flowers, or pull up weeds.
- **Mix it up!** Head into your kitchen to make something delicious.
- **Chill out!** Make yourself a fort with your favourite books, games, or movies.
- **Party!** Get some friends to take you out on the town.
- **Laugh out loud!** Watch a comedy show, a funny movie, or visit a funny friend.
- **Work out!** Head out on the road or to the gym to sweat out the stress.
- **Breathe deeply!** Practise yoga, meditation, or Pilates to stretch out that stress.
- **Fantasise!** Indulge in a day dream, read a book, or play pretend.
- **Make something!** Find a hobby and practise it every day.

Make practising good mental health a part of your daily routine and remember that if you aren't coping with stress, depression, or any other mental illness, your doctor can help.

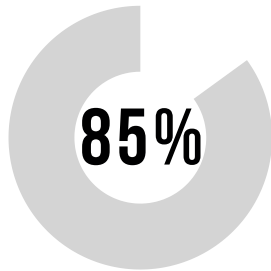
LANGEBERG MUNICIPAL DAM LEVELS: 07 OCTOBER 2025

HOW TO SAVE WATER AT HOME

TURN OFF TAPS

While washing, brushing, shaving...



TAKE SHORTER SHOWERS

instead of a bath. Close the tap, soap up, then turn water back on to rinse.



FIX

Leaking taps, pipes and toilets.

SAVE A FLUSH

and install a water-saving toilet flush system.



WASH ONLY FULL LOADS OF CLOTHES AND DISHES.

USE GREY WATER

Re-use water from baths, showers and laundry to: flush toilet, wash car, clean floor and water the garden.

CLIMATE CHANGE

IMPACTS OUR WATER RESOURCES



Climate change significantly impacts water resources worldwide, affecting availability, quality, and the frequency of water-related hazards like floods and droughts.

Although we do not have direct control over the effects of climate change, we do have control over our water usage and how water is used during drought periods.

Each individual has the responsibility to adapt to manage and minimise the impact of climate change.

HOW CLIMATE CHANGE IMPACTS WATER RESOURCES:

The warmer temperatures increase the rate of water evaporation, which affects the amount of rainfall causing drought in some areas and excess precipitation in others.

Water runoff and flooding increase, reducing the quality of water causing health risks and damage to water system infrastructure. It also disrupts food supply.

WHAT CAN I DO?

Reduce water consumption



Take short showers and turn off taps while washing, brushing and shaving.



Fix leaking taps, pipes and toilets.



Install water-saving toilet flush systems.



Choose WaterSense-labeled fixtures and appliances like showerheads and dishwashers.

Reuse water from baths, showers and laundry to flush the toilet, wash the car, clean the floor and water the garden.



Install rain tanks.



Conserve energy, opt for energy-efficient appliances and switch to LED lighting.



Embrace renewable energy like solar power for your home.



Reduce water pollution, by properly disposing of waste, avoid excessive fertilizers, and clean up pet waste to prevent runoff into waterways.



Minimise waste and recycle materials to reduce your carbon footprint.



Plant trees to absorb carbon dioxide. Create water-wise gardens with drought-resistant plants and indigenous vegetation. Use a drip irrigation systems.



Limit travel, walk, bike, use public transport or carpool, to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

SEEDS OF CHANGE: LANGEBERG'S GARDEN PROJECT

Langeberg Municipality's Social Development Department has been supporting community garden projects for several years. The initiative aims to promote food security, encourage self-sufficiency, and provide communities with access to fresh, healthy produce. By growing their own vegetables, residents can reduce household food costs and ensure families have nutritious meals throughout the year. To assist these gardens, the municipality recently provided 175 packets of seeds (carrot, squash, beans, sweetcorn and beetroot) as well as 560 kg of compost. Currently, 10 beneficiaries are receiving ongoing support from the project.

Jan's Story: A Passion for Gardening and Community

One of the beneficiaries, Jan Plaatjies from Montagu, is a shining example of the project's success. Since 2017, Jan has been tending his garden in Bath Street, Montagu, with dedication and joy. Originally from a farm near Montagu, he grew up learning how to work the soil and has carried that passion into his adult life.

"Gardening has always been a passion of mine," Jan explains. "This passion now allows me to grow and sell vegetables to the community at very affordable prices."

After years of hard work, Jan was able to buy a tractor, making it easier to cultivate the land. He says he is especially grateful for the Municipality's ongoing support. "The seeds and compost I receive make a real difference. I truly appreciate the help from Langeberg Municipality."

Through ongoing investment in resources and training, Langeberg Municipality continues to empower residents like Jan to grow their own food and build healthier, more resilient communities.

Gardening Tips from Langeberg

- Water your garden early in the morning or late afternoon to reduce water loss through evaporation.
- Use compost and mulch to improve soil quality and keep plants healthy.
- Plant a variety of vegetables to enjoy a longer harvest season and reduce the risk of pests.
- Rotate crops each season to keep the soil fertile and reduce diseases.
- Group plants with similar water and sunlight needs together for better growth.
- Harvest vegetables regularly to encourage new growth.
- Save seeds from strong, healthy plants for the next season.
- Share surplus produce with neighbours or swap vegetables to build stronger community support.
- Protect young seedlings from extreme sun or cold using shade netting or simple covers.
- Keep your garden clean and weed-free to give your vegetables the best chance to grow.

SAVE WATER AT HOME

This past year, the Langeberg Municipal region experienced less winter rainfall than usual. The lower rainfall will have a significant impact on water supply to all towns, especially if no rain falls within the next few months. Our dam levels in Robertson and Montagu are already under pressure to supply to the current demand.

REDUCE CONSUMPTION BY 10%

Although restrictions are not currently being enforced, we kindly ask for your cooperation. If each household reduces its water use by just 10%, we can avoid imposing restrictions and keep our systems stable. Here are some tips to start saving water now!



Check leaks and fix them immediately to prevent water waste.



Install a water-saving showerhead and keep showers under 3 minutes
Close the tap, soap up, then turn water back on to rinse.



Install a water-saving toilet flush system and save a flush.



Collect rainwater to water the garden or indoor plants.



Turn off the tap while soaping, brushing your teeth, shaving or doing dishes.



Re-use water from baths, showers and laundry to: flush toilet, wash car, clean floor and water the garden

Ward councillors are elected by the residents of specific wards, while proportional representation (PR) councillors are appointed by their political parties based on the proportion of votes their party receives.

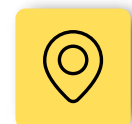

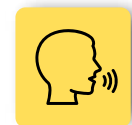

SMOKE ABOVE ASHTON LANDFILL SITE

The Langeberg Municipality is aware of the smoke and occasional flare-ups currently visible above the Ashton landfill site. We wish to inform the public of the causes, actions being taken, and safety precautions to follow.

CAUSES OF SMOULDERING AND SMOKE

The smoke and intermittent fires are primarily caused by:

- **Flammable waste:** The presence of flammable waste always contributes to the risk of burning material and smoke on a landfill site.
- **Heat build-up:** Decomposing waste generates heat, which can lead to spontaneous combustion if not properly ventilated or properly covered with soil.
- **Inadequate covering of landfill surface:** Inadequate soil cover because of the cost (manpower, equipment, material), with the presence of air pockets (oxygen), is feeding the smouldering and burning waste.
- **External ignition sources:** Sparks from machinery or metallic waste, as well as disposal of burning materials (e.g. cigarettes, hot ash) can ignite fires.
- **Solar concentrators:** Concentration of solar energy through curved glass pieces can result in high high-temperature surface and potentially result in the start of a fire.

ACTIONS BEING TAKEN

The Langeberg Waste Management staff, together with the Fire Service, are actively working to contain and reduce the impact:

- The main challenge is that the smouldering waste is below the surface, making it difficult to reach and extinguish.

- The landfill machine is used to open the area where there is smoke. The smouldering waste, in some cases, starts to burn when enough oxygen becomes available. The fire team then quenches the smoking and/or burning waste.
- Implementation of short- and long-term mitigation measures. For example, we are arranging sand buckets to be used in future by landfill workers to quench any fire or smoke as soon as it is noticed.
- Ongoing inspections and flare-up control are exercised.

PUBLIC SAFETY ADVISORY

We urge residents to take the following precautions:

- **Avoid exposure to smoke:** Stay indoors / Keep windows closed during heavy smoke periods. Use fans to circulate indoor air. Wear a mask if you must go outside
- **Protect vulnerable groups:** Children, elderly individuals, and those with respiratory conditions should avoid smoke exposure. Seek medical attention if experiencing breathing difficulties, chest pain, or dizziness
- **Cooperate with authorities:** Follow official instructions. Avoid landfill access roads to allow emergency vehicles through. Report flare-ups, smoke plumes, or illegal dumping to the fire department
- **Prevent further risk:** Do not dump hot ash, burning waste, or chemicals at the landfill / Follow municipal waste disposal guidelines to reduce fire hazards
- Langeberg Municipality regret any discomfort to any resident and/or visitor.
- We are doing what is possible at present to reduce and stop the smoke from the landfill site as soon as possible.

WET/ORGANIC WASTE

- Leftover food scraps can be kept and taken to pig farmers.
- Mix fruit peels, vegetable peels, coffee grounds, tea bags, eggshells, grass clippings, leaves, shredded paper, and small twigs together and use as compost.

DRY RECYCLABLE WASTE

- Keep materials that can be repurposed in a separate bag, such as paper, cardboard, clean glass, clean plastic and clean metal/tin.
- Langeberg Municipal provide free clear refuse bags for recycling items. Place full bags on the pavement next to your wheelie bin on waste collection days or take it to the closest Transfer Station or Ashton Material Recovery Facility.

HAZARDOUS WASTE

- Hazardous waste is items containing toxic or harmful substances, such as batteries, electronics (e-waste), paint, and some chemicals. These must be disposed of at designated collection points.
- Hazardous waste is not accepted at our Waste Disposal Facilities.
- Refer to product labels for specific disposal instructions.
- Expired or unused medications should be returned to a pharmacy.
- Hand in household batteries at take-back retail stores.
- Compact fluorescent lamps and discharge bulbs should be carefully taken to participating stores for proper disposal to avoid mercury exposure.
- Asbestos should be handled by a registered asbestos contractor in accordance with relevant legislation.
- Cleaning chemicals, pool chemicals, automotive oils, used antifreeze, paint, paint thinners, turpentine, contaminated gloves and rags, pesticides, and herbicides require special handling and disposal by private companies.
- Never pour any of the above-mentioned hazardous waste down the drain, toilet or stormwater inlet, as they contaminate our water sources.
- Hazardous waste containers should not be recycled.
- Electronic waste can be disposed of through collection services offered by E-waste Recyclers or through a retailer's take-back program.
- Working electronic equipment can be donated to organisations that distribute it to educational institutions and disadvantaged communities.
- Do not burn e-waste as this releases harmful toxins into the environment.



GENERAL WASTE

- All non-recyclable and non-hazardous materials like dirty plastics, chip packets, soiled items, milk/juice cartons, used tissues/paper towels, wax paper, tin foil, cling wrap, rubber, polystyrene/styrofoam, fabric/textiles, crockery, pottery and diapers should be disposed of in your wheelie bin and placed on the pavement on waste collection days to be taken to the municipality's landfill site.

EXPIRED FOOD

- Businesses should use sustainable methods like composting, anaerobic digestion, and bioremediation to create fertiliser and other products.
- Households should separate organic food waste (fruit and vegetable scraps, grains) from other refuse and compost it to create valuable soil amendments.

Separate your trash at home to save landfill space, keep the environment clean, save natural resources, reduce harmful gases, create jobs and make recycling easier.

LANGERBERG MUNICIPAL CEMETERIES: MANAGING FUTURE BURIAL SPACE

Langeberg Municipality is responsible for the development, management, and maintenance of municipal cemeteries. This includes handling pauper funerals, preparing bricked-out graves, maintaining cemetery records, and developing cemetery bylaws and policies. While the Municipality manages burial space and maintains the general terrain around grave plots, the upkeep of individual graves remains the responsibility of the families of the deceased.

Progress towards developing burial space

Although the lack of cemetery space is a growing challenge worldwide due to the difficulty of finding suitable land for in-ground burials, Langeberg Municipality has made significant strides to ensure that burial needs can be met in the coming years.

The most notable achievement is the expansion of the Ashton Silos Regional Cemetery, completed in 2024/2025, which created 10,000 new grave spaces. This development provides much-needed relief across the municipal area and offers families peace of mind that space is available. Additionally, several smaller cemeteries still have capacity – such as the New Cemetery in Ashbury, Montagu (2,754 graves), and Nkqubela, Robertson (609 graves) – extending the lifespan of existing cemetery facilities.

Environmental Impact Assessments (EIA) studies are also underway on newly acquired land adjacent to the White Street Cemetery in Robertson, which could add a further 550 single graves once completed.

To maximise existing space, the Municipality is converting unused internal cemetery roads into additional grave plots and prohibiting the reservation of graves for future use, ensuring fair and immediate access.

Community Partnerships and Safer Cemeteries

The cemeteries are faced with vandalism, which is a major ongoing problem in all towns. It is also often used as a site for illegal dumping or drug abuse activities. Consequently, the condition of these cemeteries are typically poor, making them unsafe and contributing to criminal activity and environmental health risks.

Cemeteries are more than burial grounds – they are places of cultural, spiritual, and historical significance. For this reason, the Municipality is placing renewed focus on making cemeteries safer, cleaner, and more dignified community spaces.

Steps include:

- Enhancing safety and security with law enforcement support to prevent vandalism, illegal dumping, and land invasion.
- Conduct maintenance and environmental services across all cemeteries.
- Fencing cemeteries where budgets allow.
- Partnering with churches and community groups to help maintain graveyards.
- Reviewing the Langeberg Municipality's Cemetery Policy and developing a Cemeteries Management Plan
- Reconcile the burial register monthly with burial receipts to ensure that the register is updated.
- Investigate alternative solutions (memorial parks, burial methods, and alternative space).
- Upgrading and management of existing and closed cemeteries.
- Formal closure of old graveyards.
- Cleaning of old cemeteries.
- Inspect cemetery premises monthly.
- Diverting underground water away from graves at the Silo's Cemetery.

MANAGING FUTURE BURIAL SPACE (CONTINUED)

The Municipality also encourages public participation in the upgrading of the areas as landscaped public spaces that can be integrated into community life – attracting walkers, photographers, birdwatchers, and even cultural tourists.

Residents have identified the following needs in the Integrated Development Plan, which will be addressed as the budget allows:

1. Installing a floodlight at the old Ashton cemetery.
2. Upgrading McGregor Cemetery (roadworks, sanitation facilities).
3. Securing land for future cemetery development in McGregor.
4. Fencing the Golf Course Cemeteries in Montagu, the Old Ashton Cemetery and the White Street Cemetery in Robertson.
5. Upgrading the Zolani Cemetery.

How the Community Can Help

- Residents can make a positive difference by:
- Taking responsibility for the upkeep of individual graves.
- Reporting vandalism, illegal dumping, or criminal activity at cemeteries.
- Joining community or church initiatives that support the upkeep of cemeteries.
- Supporting a shift in mindset around sustainable burial practices. It's important to recognise that alternative options such as cremation, reburials, multi-interment, mausoleums, and modular crypts may need to be considered in the future. With limited land available for burial globally, finding long-term solutions is essential.

Looking Ahead

While the long-term challenge of burial space remains, Langeberg Municipality has already taken strong steps towards sustainable cemetery management. By combining municipal projects with active community involvement, we can restore dignity to these spaces and preserve them for future generations.

The Robertson Swimming Pool in Dirkie Uys Street is now open and ready for the summer season. 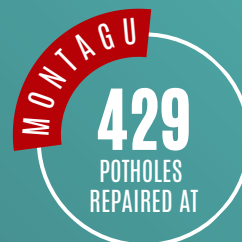

COMMUNITIES EMPOWERED THROUGH PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT SERVICES SESSIONS

Langeberg Municipality, in collaboration with the Department of Employment and Labour, successfully hosted a Public Employment Services (PES) Advocacy Campaign in Ashton, Zolani, McGregor, Montagu, Bonnievale, Nkqubela and Robertson from 9 - 25 September 2025. These sessions aimed to inform and guide work seekers about available services, while also offering on-the-spot registration opportunities.

Work seekers received guidance on career opportunities, the importance of registering as job seekers, and the role of Employment Services of South Africa (ESSA) in connecting them with potential employers. They were also encouraged to bring along their IDs, certificates and CVs to complete their registration.

This campaign gave many residents the confidence and practical tools to take their next step toward employment. For some, it was the first time learning about ESSA and the opportunities it opens, while others were able to

update their details and strengthen their chances of finding work.

“The success of this campaign shows the power of collaboration. When government departments come together, we can reach more people and make information accessible where it is needed most,” said Ms Inge Cook, Manager of Local Economic Development and Rural Development at Langeberg Municipality.

The programme was well received by communities across the Langeberg, with positive feedback highlighting the value of accessible information and on-site support. By working together, the municipality and the Department of Employment and Labour strengthened access to opportunities and created pathways for job seekers.

Residents who missed this round will have another opportunity to participate in future PES sessions, ensuring even more community members can access these valuable services.





HOW TO DO BUSINESS WITH LANGEBERG MUNICIPALITY

If you are keen to supply goods or services to Langeberg Municipality or any organ of government in South Africa, here is what you need to know to get started and stay compliant.

Doing business with local government can be a good opportunity—but it requires understanding the rules, registering properly, and keeping your details up to date.

WHAT IS THE CENTRAL SUPPLIER DATABASE (CSD)?

The Central Supplier Database (CSD) is South Africa's central online supplier register, managed by the Office of the Chief Procurement Officer (OCPO) within the National Treasury.

It serves as the single source of supplier information for:

- National and provincial departments
- Municipalities
- Public entities

Through the CSD, government entities check that suppliers are properly registered and compliant before awarding contracts.

It also hosts the E-Tender Portal, where governmental tenders and business opportunities are published.

WHY REGISTER ON THE CSD?

- You only need to register once across all government spheres—national, provincial, and local.
- Your information is used to verify things like tax compliance, business registration, bank account details, ownership / director information, and other legal credentials.
- Being registered makes you eligible for official tenders and requests for quotations from municipalities, including the Langeberg Municipality.

HOW TO REGISTER & WHAT IS REQUIRED

- To create your CSD account, go to the CSD website (secure.csd.gov.za → Account → Register) and fill in basic information (name, contact, etc.), activate via email and SMS/OTP.

2. Complete your supplier information

3. After your account is active, you must provide:

- Identification (ID number, or company registration number)
- Industry classification (what goods/services you supply)
- Contact details (phone, email, address)
- Valid bank account information
- Tax compliance status (SARS)
- Directors / members information, ownership and company registration details
- If applicable: proof of professional registrations, BBBEE status, etc..

4. Submit & get verification

5. Once you submit, the system automatically checks many of the details (tax status, business registration, bank account etc.) against external databases.

6. When it is all verified, you will get a unique supplier number and reference code.

Maintain / update your information. If any part of your details changes (bank account, business address, commodities you supply, contact persons etc.), update them promptly. Government entities rely on accurate info when sourcing suppliers.

TIPS FOR SUCCESS

- Choose commodity codes carefully: list exactly what goods/services you supply to ensure you receive notifications for relevant tenders.
- Keep your documents (tax clearance, ID, registration certificates) ready and valid. Expired or missing documentation can disqualify you.
- Be aware of BBBEE requirements: many tenders favour or require proof of Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment.
- Monitor the E-Tender Portal regularly to stay informed of new opportunities.

Women's Health

BREAST CANCER

What are the symptoms?

Early breast cancer usually doesn't show symptoms. But as the tumour grows, it can change how the breast looks or feels. Common changes include:

- A lump or thickening in or near the breast or in the armpit area
- A change in the size or shape of the breast
- Dimpling or puckering in the skin of the breast
- The nipple becoming inverted (turning inward into the breast)
- Abnormal discharge from the nipple
- Scaly, red, or swollen skin on the breast, nipple, or areola (the dark area surrounding the nipple)
- The skin of the breast taking on an orange peel look or feel.

Early detection of breast cancer:

If breast cancer is found early, there are more treatment options and a better chance for survival. Even if you feel healthy now, just being a woman and getting older puts you at risk for breast cancer. Getting checked regularly can put your mind at ease. Finding cancer early may save your life. Know how your breasts normally look and feel.

Discuss any changes you observe with your health practitioner. Breast self-examination (BSE) should be done once a month during ovulation (preferably at the same time of day). Many women have a pattern of lumpiness in their breasts, which is normal. However, if you feel or see any change in your breasts or underarms, ask your health practitioner to do a clinical breast examination (CBE) and/or refer you for further tests.

A CBE is a visual and manual examination done by a health practitioner of the entire breast - from the collarbone to the bra line, and from the armpit to the breastbone. If a CBE by a health practitioner is not part of your routine medical checkup, ask for it.

Women from age 40 should go for annual mammograms. Women 55 years+ can have a mammogram every 2 years. Women, who have other risk factors such as mutated BRCA1/2 gene, should be referred for annual mammograms.

WOMEN AND MEN GET BREAST CANCER. ARE YOU AT RISK? FIND OUT!

You have a higher risk for breast cancer if...	Why?
<i>You are older than 50</i>	The chance of getting breast cancer increases as you get older. However, even though most women are over 50 years old when they are diagnosed, women in their twenties or thirties are increasingly diagnosed with breast cancer.
<i>You have a close family member with breast cancer</i>	Your risk of breast cancer is higher if your grandparent, parent, sibling or daughter had breast cancer. The risk is even higher if your family member had it before age 50. Ask your health practitioner about genetic counselling.
<i>You have a personal history of cancer and have received treatment for it</i>	Women who have received high dose chemotherapy or who have had radiation therapy to the chest (including the breasts) before age 30 are at an increased risk for breast cancer. Studies show that the younger a woman is when receiving treatment, the higher her risk for breast cancer later in life.
<i>Your breast tissue is very dense</i>	Women whose mammograms show a larger area of dense tissue than those of women of the same age are at increased risk for breast cancer. An ultrasound may be required as dense breast tissue can make it difficult to detect possible tumours.
<i>You have never given birth or your first confinement was after the age of 35</i>	Women who never had children are at an increased risk for breast cancer. Pregnancy reduces a woman's total number of lifetime menstrual cycles, which may be the reason.
<i>You're using, or have recently used birth control pills (oral contraceptives) for many years</i>	Studies have found that women using oral contraceptives have a greater risk for breast cancer than women who have never used it. The risk decreases if women stop using it for 10 years or more.
<i>You are post-menopausal and are using combination hormone replacement therapy (HRT) (combination of oestrogen and progesterone)</i>	Breast cancer risk in women increases the most during the first 2 to 3 years of taking combined HRT. Combination HRT increases the likelihood that the cancer may be found at a more advanced stage, possibly because it reduces the effectiveness of mammograms by increasing breast density. Higher-dose combination HRT increases breast cancer risk more than lower-dose combination HRT. Breast cancer risk is reduced, 5 years after discontinuing combination treatment.
<i>You have 2 or more standard alcoholic drinks per day</i>	The use of alcohol is clearly linked to an increased risk of developing breast cancer. The risk increases with the amount of alcohol consumed. Those who have 2 or more standard drinks daily have almost twice the risk of those who drink no alcohol. Excessive alcohol use is also known to increase the risk of developing cancers of the mouth, throat, oesophagus and liver.
<i>Obesity</i>	Obesity has been linked to breast cancer. Studies have shown that lack of physical activity increases cancer risk.
Most individuals who have some risk factors never develop breast cancer.	You can reduce your risk for breast cancer by adopting a balanced lifestyle and avoiding environmental carcinogens. Be physically active, don't be overweight and limit your alcohol intake. Women who breastfeed for at least 18 months can further reduce their (and their baby's) risk.

STAY FIREWISE THIS SUMMER: PREVENT, REPORT, AND STAY SAFE

The Langeberg Municipality urges all residents and visitors to remain vigilant during the summer fire season, which typically runs from October to March. Hot, dry conditions combined with strong seasonal winds create the perfect environment for veld fires. These fires spread quickly and endanger homes, farms, wildlife, and natural landscapes.

Why fires start

Most veld fires start due to human actions, while some occur naturally, such as from lightning. Fires spread easily in areas with dense alien vegetation, long grass, or neglected land that provides abundant fuel. Just one spark can ignite a blaze.

Common causes include:

- Arson (deliberately starting fires, a criminal offence).
- Cigarette butts thrown from cars or by pedestrians.
- Unattended braai or cooking fires.
- Burning garden waste or debris without proper safety measures.
- Lightning strikes.
- Electrical faults at homes, businesses, or factories.
- Sparks from power lines during windy weather.
- Vehicle fires or accidents on dry roadside grass.
- Equipment such as lawnmowers, chainsaws, or welding tools used without spark control.

While veld fires can cause enormous damage, fire also plays a role in nature. Certain fynbos species need fire to release seeds and ensure the survival of the ecosystem.

How to prevent fires

- Fully extinguish braai fires and hot coals with water or sand.
- Avoid illegal electrical connections.
- Never play with matches or lighters.
- Do not burn waste or garden refuse.
- Dispose of cigarette butts safely and never toss them from vehicles.
- Always attended to fires.
- Maintain your property: cut grass, clear dry vegetation, and clean gutters.
- Create defensible space: clear at least 10 meters around your property of dry grass, weeds, and dead trees.

If a fire breaks out

- Report it immediately, no matter how small.
- Early reporting saves lives and reduces damage, as most fires can be contained in the first hour if acted on quickly.
- Have an evacuation plan for your family, staff, and visitors.
- Keep basic firefighting tools nearby: buckets of water or sand and serviced fire extinguishers.
- Stay updated through official municipal communication channels.
- Evacuate early if a fire approaches, as your life always comes first.
- Protect yourself from smoke: limit outdoor activity and use an N95 mask if available.
- Keep a “go bag” ready with essentials.

What to pack in a go bag

Keep your bag light but smart. Store it near your front door, garage, or car, and refresh it every six months.

- Essentials: Water (3L per person), energy bars or tinned food, manual can opener, first aid kit, personal medication (7-day supply), face masks, flashlight with batteries, phone charger/power bank, whistle, multi-tool, soap/sanitiser, copies of ID and important documents, and some cash.
- Clothing & comfort: Change of clothes, sturdy shoes, hat, rain jacket, emergency blanket or light sleeping bag, gloves.
- Special needs: Baby supplies, pet food and leashes, prescription equipment, glasses/contact lenses, and hearing aids with spare batteries.
- Optional extras: Matches/lighter in a waterproof container, notebook and pen.

LET'S SECURE OUR MUNICIPALITY

Cybersecurity Awareness Month is a period of reflecting on the critical importance of protecting our digital footprint, whether at home or in the workplace. This year's global theme is "Secure our World", which puts emphasis on Cybersecurity as a shared responsibility in which small actions taken can translate into a huge difference in the digital space.

Why does Cybersecurity Awareness Matter in the Municipality Workplace?

Cyber threats and risks are constantly evolving in the workplace, ranging from phishing emails to ransomware attacks, wherein malicious elements are always looking for opportunities to exploit vulnerabilities on organisational networks. Even one weak link can compromise an entire network and/or IT system, adversely affecting the entire Municipality, in our case.

Initiatives undertaken by the Municipality in relation to Cybersecurity

- The strengthening and reviewing of ICT policies and procedures.
- Regular security audits and network monitoring.
- Simulation of phishing campaigns to raise awareness.
- Monthly Cybersecurity awareness e-mails.
- Vulnerability testing and Cybersecurity assessments.

However, the biggest factor in Cybersecurity is the HUMAN FACTOR. Therefore, remember – Cybersecurity starts with you.

Let's work together to Secure Our World—one click, one password, one update at a time.

Here are some Cybersecurity habits for users to practice daily:



The use of strong and complex passwords in adherence to the Municipality's ICT Security Policy. This includes the avoidance of using the same password in all user accounts.



- Administrative users are advised to enable Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA), such as OTPs and biometrics, which adds an extra layer of protection even if a password can become compromised.



- Remain cautious and recognising of phishing emails especially those requesting sensitive information and/or urgent action. Where unsure, kindly enquire with the IT Helpdesk or send an email to ittechnical@langeberg.gov.za.



- Ensure that you allow your computer to run security updates as and when they pop-up as this ensures the minimisation of vulnerabilities.
